

Everything from Indians to Swimming

The Milton Recreation Committee's three playgrounds will be a bustle of activity this week and the week of August 30 to September 3, as the staff and children prepare for the Recreation Committee's Old Fashioned Days program.

Tuesday, August 31 is to be Demonstration Night at the swimming pool and the various organizations involved are working hard, practicing for the program. Jane MacEachern, Glenda Emerson, Jill Sargent, Susan Vandeman, Susan French and Wendy Murphy are the six members of the Splashettes, a Milton synchronized swimming club who will perform at the event.

The Milton Scuba Diving Club and Old Fashioned Days Club Randell will also give demonstrations of their skill in the water. A Red Cross water safety display is also planned. Mrs. Paul Kent of the Milton Red Cross will be present to award swimming certificates to children who passed tests during the swimming lessons carried out at the pool this summer.

A costume and Talent Night will be held at the Town Hall at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, September 1. Recreation director Bob Small reports that the top three contestants in each contest will be awarded \$70, \$75 and \$5 respectively. The contest is open to the public and admission is free.

Anyone interested in entering the talent contest should register with Mr. Small by Friday, August 27. Judges for both the talent and costume contests are being contacted.

A girls versus boys baseball game is planned for Thursday evening at 6:30 p.m. in the Rotary Park. The game is to be half softball and half hardball and should provide a great deal of entertainment for spectators. Admission is free.

Friday afternoon will be the highlight of two weeks of work for the leaders and children of the three playgrounds. By Friday noon a Pioneer Village with a Sheriff's office, a General Store, a Barber Shop and a Saloon that sells root beer, will be erected inside of the fence surrounding the pool. An Indian Village, replica of Camp Mildaca, will be erected outside of the pool and day camp children, who will be dressed as Indians, will reenact some of the activities of the last two weeks of day camp.

A parade of all the children from the playgrounds and Camp Mildaca is scheduled to leave the "Brewers' Retail store at 12 noon on Friday, proceed along Main St. to James St., turn right onto St. James, then right again on-

to Mill St., and turn left to the Rotary Park. Mr. Small expects the parade will consist of two bands, a float made by the children, horses and doll carriages, bicycles and wagons decorated appropriately by the children for Old Fashioned Days.

All children who have attended the day camp or any one of the playgrounds during the summer are invited to attend the playgrounds the week of August 30 to September 3 to prepare for the parade. Mr. Small expects the children to have a lot of fun preparing for and participating in the parade.

Once the parade arrives at the Rotary Park, the afternoon program of races and contests will begin. Planned contests include

relay races, climbing a greasy pole, tipping canoes, log rolling and balloon races. All children are invited to participate in the contests. A raid on the Pioneer Village by the Indians of the Indian Village is also scheduled in the afternoon entertainment.

Display Work

Examples of all the children's work throughout the summer will be on display for parents and friends.

Mr. Small notes that the success of all the events planned depends on the participation of Milton and area residents. He asks everyone to come out either as participants or spectators during the week of Old Fashioned Days.

ional amount approved for the sewage plant work, there was an additional \$100,000 in the capital budget for this year. Mr. Reynolds said this would give the town a chance to get the Town Hall project on Williams Ave. roadwork okayed this year.

To date in 1965, the town has committed \$451,500 from its capital works budget, including the arena renovations, senior public

school on Martin St., new water-mains and the sewage plant. Members observed the financial picture seems bright, and the capital spending situation seemed under control.

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Anglican Church Rector Attends Synod Meeting

Rev. Dr. T. M. Dustan, Rector of Grace Anglican Church, Milton, leaves this weekend for Vancouver where he will attend the General Synod meeting of the Anglican Church of Canada. Dr. Dustan will be a voting delegate, in his position as a member of the Board of Management, Department of Missions, a post he holds on behalf of the Diocese of Niagara.

He will be Halton County's only voting delegate at the important Synod meeting. Highlights of the Synod will be the vote — by Bishops, clergy and laity — on the preliminary, but vital phase of union with the United Church of Canada. Some 400 delegates, representing a cross-Canada membership of about 1,400,000, will be participating in the vote on the

second day of the August 25-September 2 Synod meeting.

The vote will be taken on a document called "The Principals of Union between the Anglican Church of Canada and the United Church of Canada". It has been given preliminary endorsement by committees of the two churches and the United Church will take a vote on it in September, 1966. It is expected to take five to 10 years before total union could be implemented, if both churches approve the merger, as the present document deals only with principals and all the details will have to be studied and worked out later.

Dr. Dustan is travelling to Vancouver by train and will fly home September 4.



COUNCIL BRIEFS

In a two hour council meeting on Monday at the Town Hall:

- Mayor Svd Childs said he would look into the possibility of reorganizing the Santa Claus program. It was noted the firemen and Legionnaires who previously sponsored the annual event had decided to quit through lack of support.
- Clerk R. B. Reynolds was delegated to the Ontario Municipal Association Conference in Toronto, and other members of council plan to attend some of the business sessions.
- The Separate School crossing guard was to receive a raise in remuneration of \$1 daily, bringing his salary to \$20 per week.
- Milton Hydro was asked to erect a street light just inside the

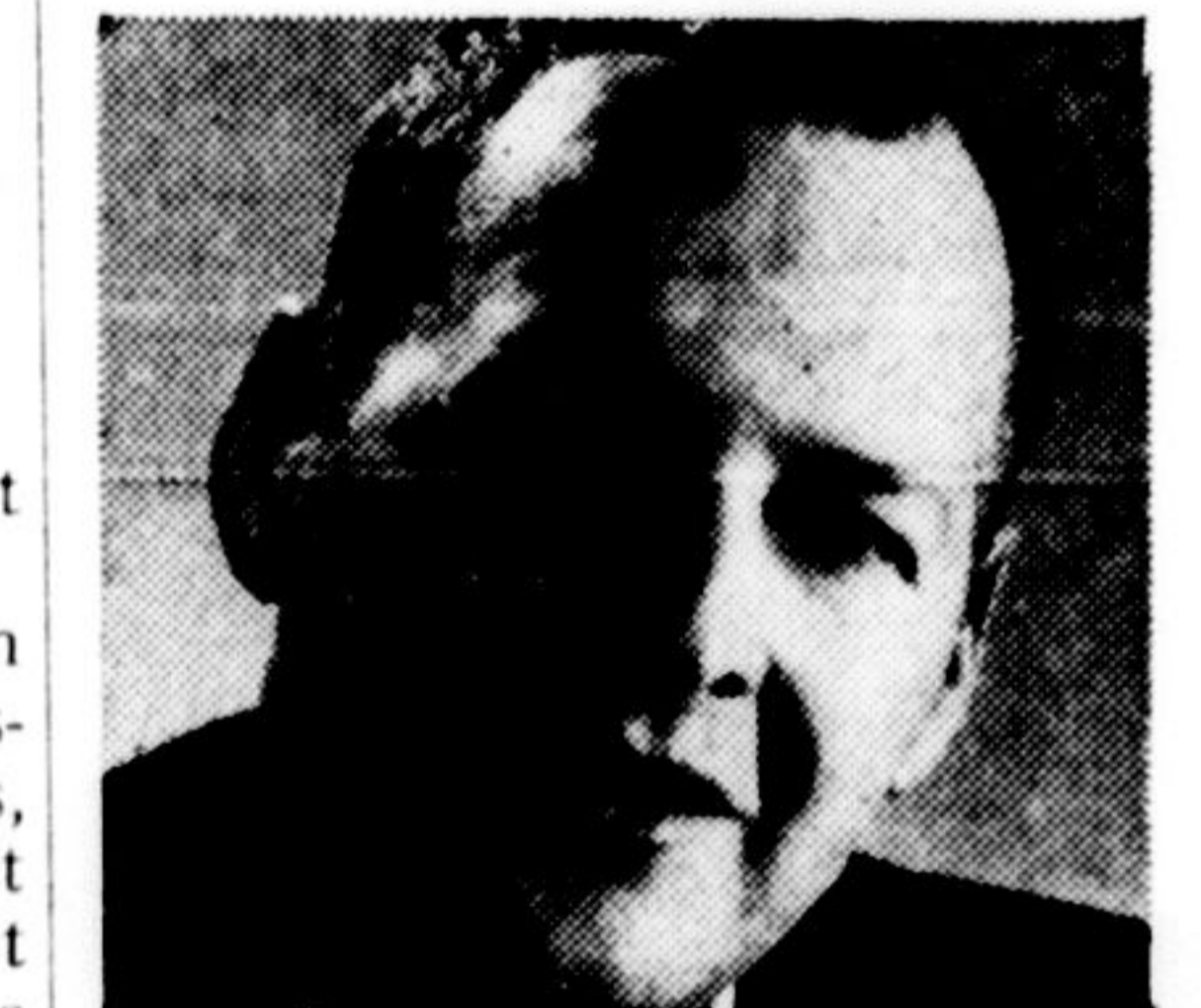
fair grounds at the new Robert St. gates.

An Owen Sound resolution calling for the abolition of disposable soft drink containers, was filed. Members agreed it was not their position to prohibit the sale of these disposable glass containers.

Milton Hydro asked the town to expropriate an Ontario St. Property beside the C.P.R. tracks for a one-floor substation building. But council asked the Hydro to keep the building well back from the crossing so motorists would have a good view of train traffic.

A Fort Frances resolution seeking better legislation covering the municipal costs for indigent funerals was endorsed.

Red Cross Official Impressed by Kelso

A senior officer of the Ontario Red Cross visited the Kelso Conservation Area's two swimming areas Sunday — at the height of the day when a record crowd was attempting to bathe and cool off on the summer's hottest day to date — and he pronounced the lifeguards there to be doing "an efficient and effective job".

Morgan Devers, Red Cross Supervisor for this area, brought his wife and children along and spent the afternoon observing Kelso's 14 lifeguards during their busiest day all summer. He visited both the swimming pool and a swimming area at the west end of Glen Eden Lake at Kelso, and chatted with many of the lifeguards about their work.

Kelso superintendent Ross Johnson said Mr. Devers was quite impressed with the water safety measures taken at Kelso.

FRIDAY 13th ACCIDENT

Friday the 13th was traditionally "unlucky" for two men involved in a two-car accident on Highway 401 near Campbellville, at supper time.
