

Institute Enjoys Museum Tour Truck Driver in Freak Accident

Tour Kelso Museum

The group then went into the museum and had a delightful time for nearly an hour looking over the relics gathered from homes in Halton county area. The names of donors are familiar.

The picnic supper table was set up in the museum and all enjoyed the repast. At this time, the curator Major Newman gave an enlightening address on the Kelso museum. He stated that it is expected that more buildings will be built until at least eight are opened for the exhibits. A log school is likely to be moved from the Burlington area and a recently closed one-room school will also be a centre of attraction soon. Major Newman has planned several other museums and had retired but when requested, has worked for the last three years on this Kelso project and when it is completed, it will be the largest museum in Canada.

Discard Relics

Major Newman answered many questions asked by the group and Mrs. D. Downs thanked him for giving his time. Truck Accident

A freak accident caused much excitement and traffic was tied up on 401 Highway on Thursday, August 12, when a large transport tractor trailer owned by the London Forwarding Co. went out of control after the left front tire on the cab blew out. The accident happened just before the overpass on the 5th Line when the empty flat transport going east to Toronto suddenly shot across the boulevard, through the opposite westbound traffic, breaking off several guard rails and cables and started down the embankment on the west side. The transport squeezed between a guy wire and hydro pole, missed cable poles, crossed

the 5th Line road, went on into a field, crossed a creek and finally buried the cab in the creek bank.

Driver Hurt

The driver was badly shaken up and suffered severe cuts on his legs. He received first aid from a passing motorist on 401 and was later taken to hospital. The windshield of the cab was broken. Traffic was tied up for most of an hour when curious motorists jumped out of their vehicles to look over the bridge at the commotion below.

About 6.30 p.m., tow trucks aided by police and others managed to get the large vehicle back on the road. Luckily, no cars or persons happened to be in the path as the transport in its hectic journey passed through two lines of traffic.

Both twirlers were in a rare form as Bostock claimed eight strikeouts and Waldie fanned 13 batters.

The Raiders took the lead in the fourth frame when a single by Vi Schicht, Waldie and Diane Duncan produced one run. Oakville tied the count in the fifth when Anne Rutherford poked a long line drive into right field for a homer.

In the opening round the Raiders romped to a 10-4 victory over the Dixie Belles to qualify for the semi-finals. Marsha Waldie hurled a masterful game, scattering four hits and five walks, while claiming 16 strikeouts in the seven inning stint. She also came up with a prodigious performance at the plate rapping a triple, double, two singles and a walk in five trips.

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Award Three Contracts For Township Building

Three contracts for work on the new Nassagaweya Township Municipal Building were awarded at a township council meeting on Monday.

Campbell's of Milton was asked to supply drapes at \$519.34; Bryon Essery of Campbellville was awarded a \$249.88 contract for landscaping and planting; and Caroline Nurseries was awarded one for sodding at \$432.

Also at Monday's meeting, council:

• Decided to advertise for a full time assessor to replace George Goldstraw who recently resigned.

• Donated \$25 to St. David's Church Ladies Aid for catering at the official opening of the Post Office.

• Learned the historical marker at Brookville, part of the township's centennial project plans, would not be approved and the money set aside for this project was to be added to park improvements at Campbellville and Eden Mills so the full grants could be utilized.

• Applied to the Ontario Municipal Board for permission to advise ratepayers of the new restricted area by-law 18-65 (a holding-by-law on zoning) by publication, rather than by individual notice.

• Assumed the Township's six and one-quarter per cent share of improvements to the C.N.R. crossing at the Erin-Nassagaweya Town Line at Crewson's Corners.

• Asked Ontario Hydro to install five street lights at the new

way and one behind the new hall. • Instructed Kingsway Monument Works of Milton to add service crests and officers' ranks to the names of 1939-45 War veterans on the monument at Haltonville corner.

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
