Mrs. Grant Campbell was in charge of the program. She read

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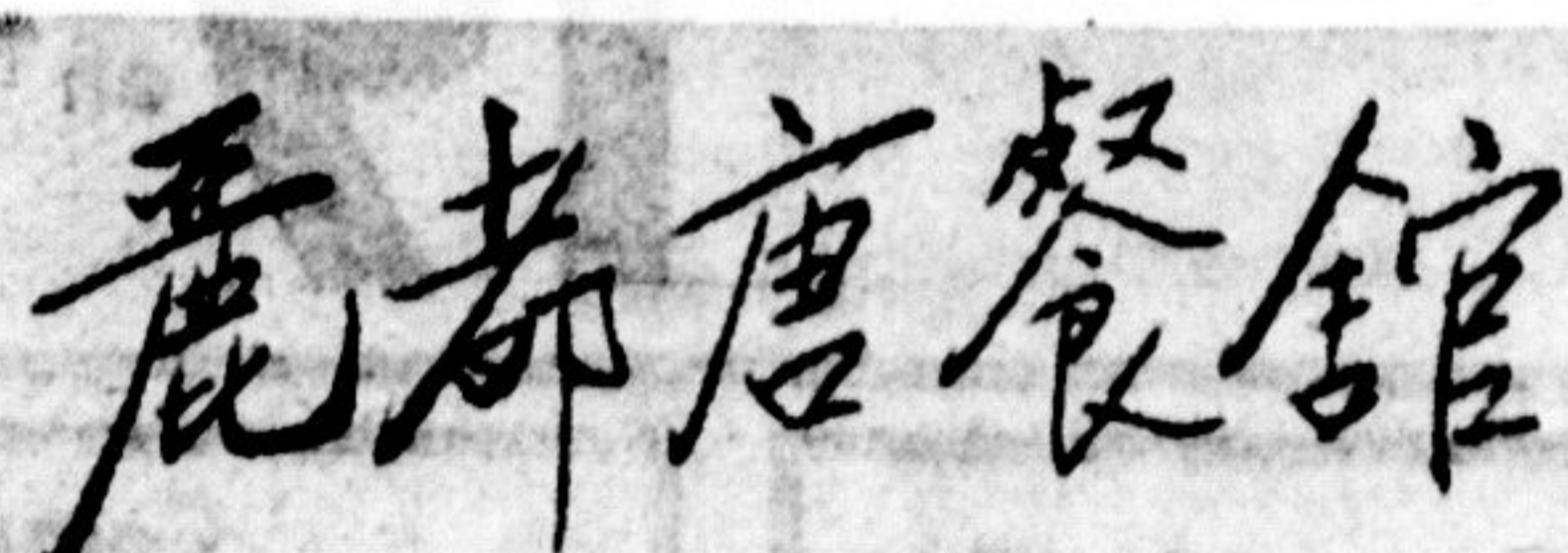
RASH PEDESTRIAN

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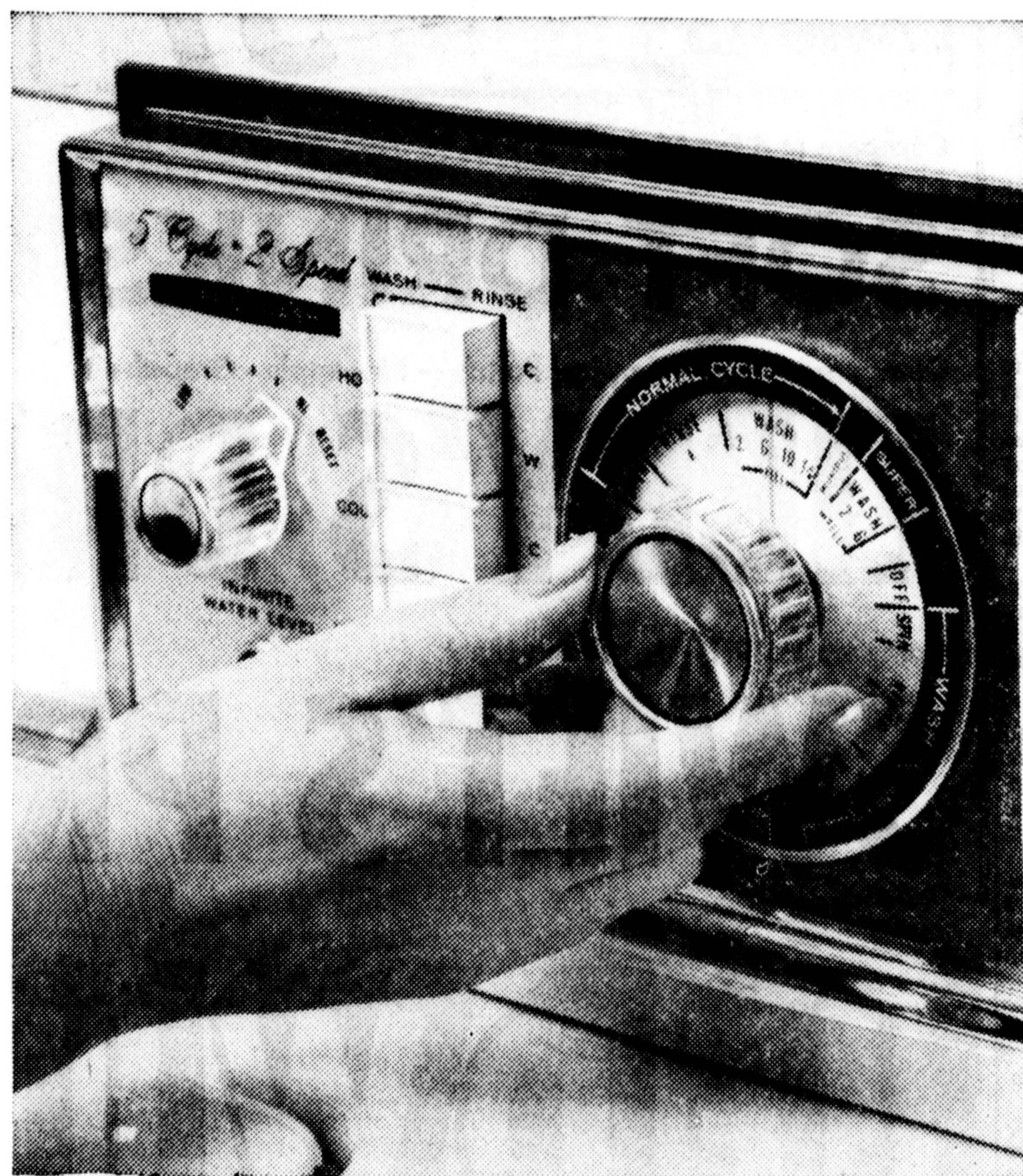
