Delay Signing of Contract On \$306,000 Sewage Plant

Milton Council Monday approved the signing of a \$306,000 contract with J. P. Morgan Co. Ltd. for construction of the addition to the town's sewage treatment plant, subject to the approval of Central Mortgage and Housing.

Councillor B. Best pointed out delays in proceeding on the job could result in concrete having to be heated if it was laid in the colder months. He predicted this could add \$15,000 to the job.

Final CMHC approval had not yet been obtained although O.M.B. approval had been granted. A contribution estimated at \$51,000 is expected from the CMHC.

Members hesitated to sign the contract prior to the approval, but agreed to immediate signing when that approval was obtained. The resolution, originally calling for signing of the contract, was finally passed when it was qualified with the phrase "subject to CMHC approval". It was suggested preliminary

work could be initiated, such as excavating, if the town indicated its intent when the approval was received. When it was suggested the approval was imminent, members agreed to the resolution.

The treatment plant addition will be the second to the basic plant. Treatment to serve a population of an estimated 11,000 will be provided when the addition is complete.

children, soap box cars, an antique horse carriage and two groups of majorettes. All children who are entered in the parade should be at the store no later than 6.30 p.m.

Friday Climax

The parade will go down Main St. and across to the Rotary Park, where the Demonstration Night will be held. The planned program includes the presentation of swimming awards to children who attended the swimming lessons at the pool this summer, synchronized swimming, water safety, scuba diving and canoeing displays.

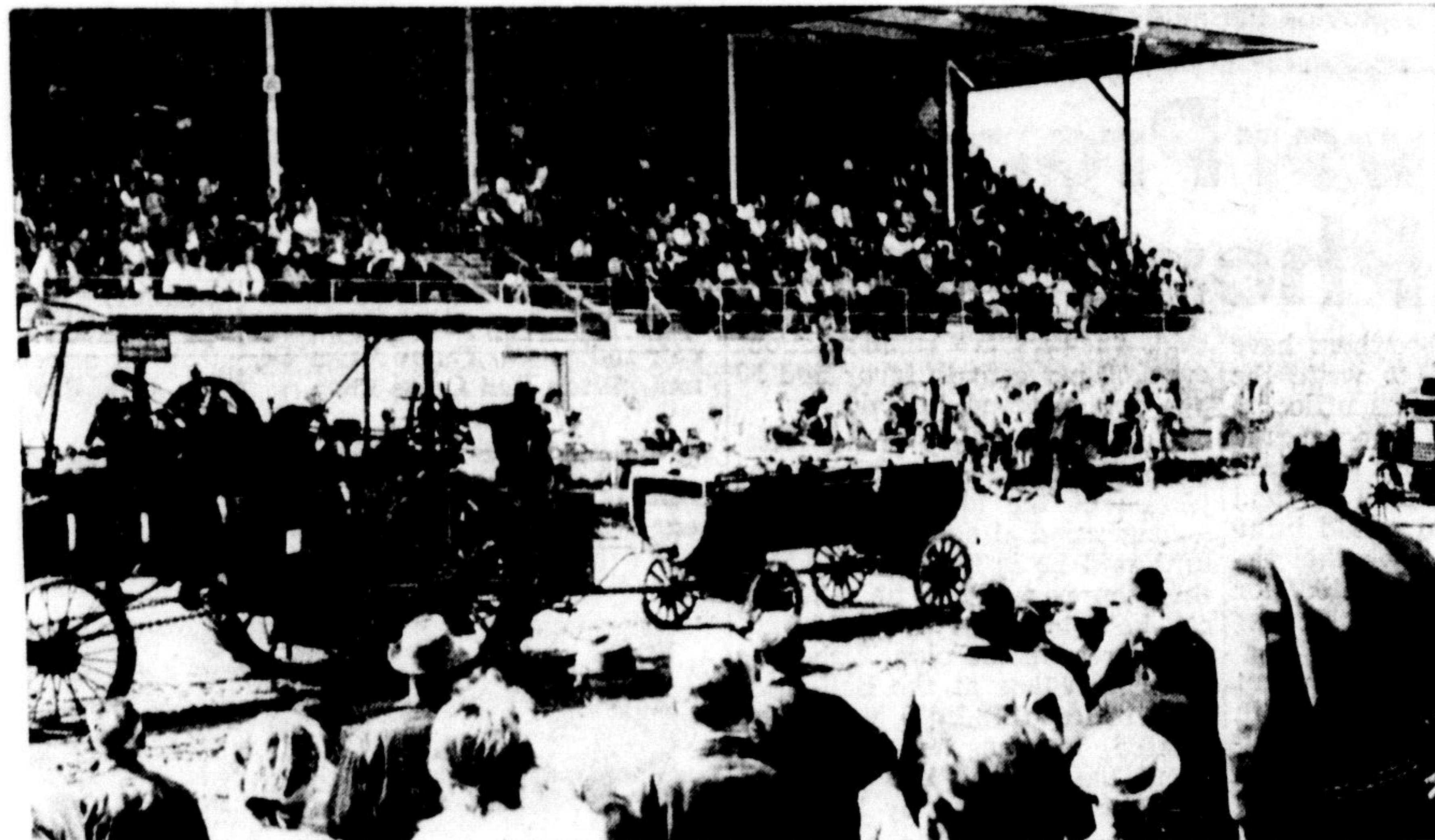

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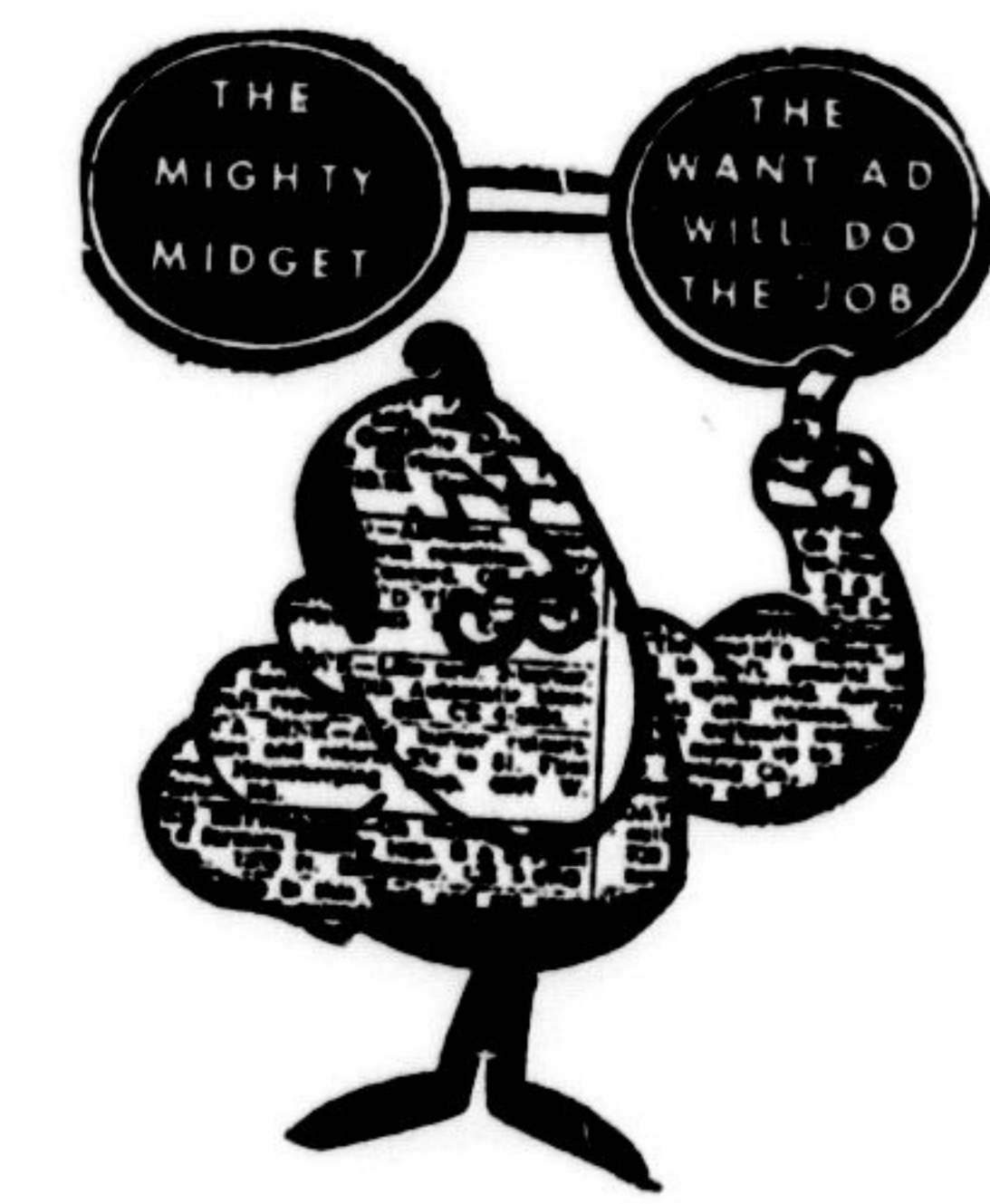
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
