250 Students for Milton School for Deaf Temporary Accommodation for Intermediates

A full time staff of 144, including 13 new teachers, is ready to open the doors of the Ontario School for the Deaf, Ontario St., Milton, for approximately 250 deaf and hard of hearing students next week. The large senior school addition at O.S.D. was to have been ready for occupancy this September, but the construction work was started too late to have it ready. This year 40 students were eligible to graduate from Junior School to Intermediate School but the accommodation was not ready, so the senior dining room in the present school has been partitioned off and four classes are being set up there.

The delay in the school addition also caused accommodation problems, as the present residential accommodation (seven dormitories) will handle just 210 children. So 40 of the oldest girls have been billeted temporarily in the upper floor of the staff residence, and they will move to new quarters during the year if the addition is ready by time.

Their program this year includes about 40 to 45 children. All of the new teachers, with the exception of one took a five-week summer course at O.S.D. Belleville. This course, coupled with two years of classroom teaching and in-service training, leads to a specialist's certificate in teaching deaf children.

Federal Loan To Burlington Approval of a federal government loan of \$580,000 to town of Burlington, to assist in the construction of a sewage treatment plant was announced today by the Honorable John R. Nicholson Minister responsible to Parliament for Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation. Made under the terms of the National Housing Act, the loan is for a period of 20 years with interest at 5 1/2 per cent per annum and is based on an estimated cost of \$920,000. Burlington will construct the third phase of the East End Trunk Sanitary Sewer, of which the first two phases have been the subject of previous NHA loans. When completed, the sewer will run from the eastern half of the town to the Skyway Sewage Treatment Plant and the third phase will extend from Seneca Street to Walker's Line.
