

# Baby Sox Win Marathon Contest Battle Clinton Next in O.B.A. Play

Thirteen innings of sterling relief work by Ron Naylor finally paid off on Monday as the Milton Red Sox Juveniles downed Stoney Creek 7-6 in 17 innings to win the first round of the Ontario Baseball Association Juvenile "B" playdowns.

The marathon contest, the longest in many seasons, featured some of the best ball played this summer as the two evenly matched squads both received outstanding pitching performances.

Naylor, star of the Juveniles throughout the year, came in to relieve starter Doug Coverdale in the fifth inning and over the final 13 innings allowed four runs and nine hits. In the 17th inning he cracked out a double, moved to third on a ground out and scored on an infield error to provide the winning run.

Stoney Creek took the lead in the contest with two runs in the fourth inning and it stayed that way until the seventh when Milton put together a four run inning. Going into the bottom half of the ninth, the locals still held the lead but a single and a home run forced the game into extra innings.

Both teams went scoreless until the 14th inning when Murray

Dawson singled, moved to second when Steve Gervais was hit by a pitched ball and scored on a single by Jerry Duncan. In the bottom of the 14th Stoney Creek tied the score again on a double, a walk and a single.

In the 15th inning Milton again took the lead as Tom Ramshaw singled and scored following singles by Frank Bertasson and Richard Clement. A double and an error enabled Stoney Creek to tie the score in the 15th. Both teams were held scoreless in the 16th.

Ron Naylor doubled in the 17th moved to third and scored on an error to put the Sox in front again and this time in the bottom half of the inning they retired the side in order as Naylor struck out two of the three batters.

The king-sized Milton lefty whiffed 12 batters in registering the verdict.

Steve Gervais singled and homered. Murray Dawson singled three times and Ron Naylor doubled and singled. Tom Ramshaw singled twice and other single safeties went to Richard Clement, John Zoppas, Jerry Duncan, Frank Bertasson and Marty Scelsizzi.

The victory gives the Baby Red Sox the right to advance to the second round of O.B.A. play against Clinton. The starting time for the series has not been set but it is expected it will get underway on the weekend.
