

Milton Library displayed a natural item for a library, old books. Many of the books had leather covers. Some dated back to 1855 and the Mechanics Institute that was the forerunner of the present library.

A bonnet and shawl and a stone mason's mallet at the McKim Hardware store both took long trips before reaching Milton. The shawl and bonnet, owned by Gordon McIntosh, Main St. came from Ireland on an early sailing vessel and the mallet came from Scotland. A pancake griddle, a corn cake pan, spring skates, a photograph album and a gun belonging to Mr. McKim were also on display along with a gun and iron owned by Sid Birdsey of St.

David's. A fourth generation "Melodeon" dating back to 1850 and Indian crafts collected by manager Lorne Skuce were shown in the Halton and Peel Trust and Savings Office. The "Melodeon" belonged to the great - grandmother of Miss Linda Watson, one of the tellers in the office. Mr. Skuce's collection includes a medicine man's rattle, an Indian fish net made from willow bark, an Indian head painted on Birch bark, a stone skinning knife and many other artic-


