Ayrshire Breeders High in Production

A. H. Clark, Georgetown, had the top scoring herd in Canada last year in R.O.P. in Group C, Ayrshires, for those with 26 to 40 records. Mr. Clark's 28 cows average 12,702 lbs. of milk and 489 lbs. of butterfat. This is a Breed Class Average of 164 for milk and 153 for butterfat.

The 12 Ayrshires at the O.A.C. averaged 12,297 for milk and 535 for butterfat, for a B.C.A. of 152 and 161.

In Group D, for those with 41 or more records, Clark Bros., Norval, placed third. Their 71 records averaged 10,917 for milk, 435 for butterfat, for a B.C.A. of 135 and 132.

Group A, for those with six to 15 records, was won by the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.

Halton Has Most Winners In C.N.E. Judging Contest

The 29 4H and Junior Farmer competitors from Halton had the highest number of winners in the Junior Competition on September 3. They won 34 prizes, edging out Wellington for the first time (29 prizes) and North Simcoe (28 prizes). There were 191 contestants in the Junior section for those 15 to 17 years of age.

In the Livestock division, Carol Swackhamer, R. R. 2, Acton, placed first with a score of 287 out of 300. Others from Halton were: 12th, Marg Brownridge, R. R. 2, Georgetown, 272; 13th, Pete Sweetman, R. R. 1, Hornby, 271; 18th, Margaret King, R. R. 4, Milton, 269; 18th, John McGee, R. R. 1, Norval, also with 269.

Princess is Second
In the Senior Livestock section, with 102 contestants, Marg Hunter, R. R. 1, Burlington, our Halton County Dairy Princess, was second with 293 points. Each competitor in the Livestock section judged a class of Holsteins, Herefords, Hampshires and hog carcasses, and answered a livestock quiz.

In the Field and Horticultural Crops section, there were classes of oats, hay, apples, potatoes, with weeds, forage plants and forage seeds to identify. Halton winners were as follows:

Junior Division: Walter Trysenaar, R. R. 3, Acton, second with 290; fifth, Carol Swackhamer, R. R. 2, Acton, with 234; sixth, Pete Sweetman, R. R. 1, Hornby, with 232; seventh, Bob Leslie, R. R. 3, Acton, with 231; tied for 14th were Elizabeth Norrington, R. R. 6, Milton and Verna Thompson, R. R. 2, Milton, with 278; 20th, Dan Heatherington, R. R. 3, Campbellville, with 274.

Senior Section: 10th, Art Lawson, R. R. 5, Milton; Harold Timbers, R. R. 2, Milton; and Lloyd Zuest, R. R. 6, Milton, each with 284; 15th, Jeff Nurse, R. R. 2,

Georgetown, with 281; and Bill Alexander, R. R. 1, Norval; Lorne Ella, R. R. 1, Hornby and Marg Hunter, R. R. 1, Burlington, tied for 20th with 280.

Machinery Quiz
In the Farm Engineering section, the boys and girls had to answer a general machinery and safety quiz and identify 20 tractor parts and give their function. **Junior Division:** second, Ken Wilson, R. R. 3, Milton, 275; fifth, Wayne Aitken, R. R. 3, Acton, 257; 10th, Dan Heatherington, R. R. 3, Campbellville, 256; 12th, Verna Thompson, R. R. 2, Milton, 254. **Senior Division:** First, Art Lawson, R. R. 5, Milton, 295; 17th, Harold Thompson, R. R. 2, Milton, 271; Lorne Ella, R. R. 1, Hornby, 271 with 266.

In the Junior Championship for overall scoring in all three divisions, Carol Swackhamer was second with a score of 808, just two points below the winner, Verna Thompson, R. R. 2, Milton, was sixth with 795 points and Dan Heatherington, R. R. 3, Campbellville, was 11th with 780.

Three in Top 20
In the Senior Championship, Art Lawson, R. R. 5, Milton, was third with 850 points; Marg Hunter, R. R. 1, Burlington, was seventh with 835; Lorne Ella, R. R. 1, Hornby, was 19th with 811 points.

For the first year, Halton was entered in the 4H Demonstration Competition. The Verna Thompson and John McGee was defeated by the Beverly 4H Dairy Club team from Wentworth County.

Following the competition, all the competitors were guests of the C.N.E. at the evening grandstand show.

Voluntary Basis

Change Vaccination Program

Calfhood vaccination under the Brucellosis Act will be placed on a voluntary rather than a compulsory basis on January 1 of next year, the Veterinary Services Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture announced today. However, the Department will continue to pay for the vaccination services rendered to livestock owners by veterinarians.

Dr. Harold Worton, Director of the Branch, has notified all veterinarians concerned of the changes in the governing legislation, and has advised the profession that commencing January 1, 1966, the age limits for vaccination will be from the fourth month birth date to not later than the ninth month birth date.

Until it is legal, until December 31, 1965, to vaccinate calves up to and including the eleventh month birth date, farmers and veterinarians are urged in the interval to confine vaccinations to calves not over the ninth month birth date. It is further recommended that where possible calves be vaccinated between four and six months of age.
