The school now contains 16 classrooms, a library, four science labs, three commercial rooms, two home economics rooms, three industrial arts shops, two gymnasiums, a cafeteria, staff room and kitchen.

Review Rentals
A review of the rental schedule for the new facilities including the new double gymnasium and the cafeteria dining made in area shops. Rental of the single auditorium last year had been \$25, but new rates had not been established since completion of the double gymnasium.

Secretary E. Millson reported applications for the rental of the auditorium for political meetings that would require immediate answers, and members approved rental of \$50 for these events pending establishment of a rate schedule.

Key System
Members spent considerable time reviewing the policy of distributing school keys and deciding whether classroom doors should be locked at night. It was noted when vandals broke into the school, most of the damage had been to locked classroom doors. Members decided doors should continue to be locked.

Department heads, confirmed by the board included: English, L. M. Darby; History, P. Altman; Physical Education, A. Claremont; Mathematics, J. Sullivan; Science, W. Robinson; French, Miss L. Walsh; Commercial, Mrs. M. Powys; Industrial Arts, J. Hopkings; Home Economics, Mrs. M. Thompson; Guidance, E. Litt.

A letter from the Milton Public School Board thanked the High School Board for the transfer of furniture remaining in the Martin St. school.

A request for a change in the school bus routes as they affect the Hornby area was noted, and it was explained some changes had been made to return students to their homes earlier. The resident noted students had taken two hours after school to get to Hornby.

Mix Tuition
The board refused to pay tuition fees for a student to take a course in Burlington that was presently being offered in Milton.

Trustee John Noble, recently appointed to the board by the town, attended his first meeting. He succeeds D. A. G. MacEachern, who resigned when he left town.

The board declined to pay tuition fees for a student to Central

Technical School, Toronto, on the basis the student had already achieved a secondary school graduation diploma.

Two delegates were authorized to attend a seminar being planned by the Ontario School Trustees' and Ratepayers' Association, on salary schedules, negotiations and board - teacher relations.

Cut Jr. Equipment
Purchase of \$332 of football equipment was approved to complete the equipment for the senior team. Plans to equip a junior team had been cut when the text book budget had exceeded its amount.

Principal R. C. Hunter reported a number of appeals on grade 13 papers had been treated favorably, and many students had been given standings in subjects as a result of the appeals. Accounts totalling \$9,364.60 were approved for payment.

A tender of \$875 from Rainbow Garden Stone Products was approved for landscaping the school grounds.

About 30 to Enroll In St. John Course

The "first aid to the injured" course being sponsored by the St. John Ambulance Corps begins tonight (Wednesday) at the United Steelworkers' Hall, Pine St., beginning at 8 p.m. and instructor Don Miller of Milton reported that about 30 indicated a willingness to take the course.

The St. John brigade in Milton is in the process of acquiring a charter, and this is the first project of the new group. Formerly, Miltonians served with the Acton division.

The course continues each Wednesday for seven weeks, followed by an examination night; the eighth week, and is open to men and women 15 years old and over.

Roads Fogbound

District roads were fogbound early Saturday morning and several car accidents resulted. Most serious incidents were three separate accidents that happened at the same intersection north of Milton, all within eight minutes of each other. When police had the investigation completed it turned out five drivers had been involved in three mishaps — one of them in two of the accidents. The first collision came at 8.13

a.m. at the intersection of Highway 25 and Five Sideroad, involving cars driven by E. Robert Reed of 416 Woodward St., Milton, and Robert E. Dredge, R.R. 3 Milton. Damage totalled \$275.

A car driven by John B. Wood of R.R. 1 Acton and the Reed car were then involved in another accident, with \$150 damage resulting. A few minutes later cars driven by Marlene Irving of R.R. 3 Milton and Raymond E. Mackez of R.R. 1 Acton collided at the same corner with \$500 damage.
