

District Ministers to Chair Committees of New Presbytery

A prayer that the new Presbytery of Brampton within the Presbyterian Church in Canada would be found worthy was voiced by its newly-elected Moderator, the Rev. Robert McMillan of Oakville, at its inaugural meeting in the Presbyterian Church, Brampton, on Tuesday, September 14.

Formed by action of the 91st General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, the new Presbytery was carved out of parts of the Presbyteries of West Toronto, Orangeville and Guelph, and comprises all of Peel County, all of Halton County except Burlington and the southern part of Dufferin County.

Dr. L. H. Fowler of Aurora, in bringing the greetings of the General Assembly, pointed out that the Presbytery today carries out the same basic functions as it did in the early post-reformation days, but that there were many additions to its responsibilities and that there was need of additional personnel to administer its work, which he saw to be of vital importance to the church.

An interesting event was the presentation by the Rev. F. R. M. Anderson, Moderator of West Toronto Presbytery, from which the bulk of the new Presbytery was drawn, of a specially made moderator's gavel. The wood of the handle was brought over by United Empire Loyalists and that of the head was from the spire of the old St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Niagara-on-the-Lake, burned during the war of 1812.

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Classes for Expectant Parents Give Knowledge, Understanding

A series of nine weekly classes for expectant parents will be conducted again this year under the direction of the Public Health Nursing Service. The first series of classes this year will start on October 5 at 7 p.m. at the Halton County Health Unit, 155 King St., Milton, Halton's director of nursing Miss Grace J. Leavey reports.

The classes are designed to assist parents to anticipate the birth of a baby with confidence through knowledge and understanding, Miss Leavey notes.

"Many parents recognized the need for this knowledge to prepare them for the responsibilities of parenthood, and they are becoming increasingly aware of

the relationship of health to successful, happy living."

Sign Request

A signed request by the family physician is required for registration. Relaxation and breathing techniques are demonstrated to assist the mother to carry her baby with the least discomfort.

"In our home visiting program, our Public Health Nurses offer instruction and guidance to mothers who find it not possible to attend regular classes. We hope that through our efforts and those of others concerned with this group, we have made significant contributions toward the promotion and maintenance of healthful family living," the director of nursing concluded.
