# M. Caputo on U.A.W. Committee Seeking Price Reduction in Cars

Irregardless of which party forms the next Canadian government, unless car prices are reduced before parliament re-convenes next winter they'll have Marty Caputo of Milton and several United Auto Workers associates knocking on their door with protests.

Mr. Caputo, a member of Local 1067 U.A.W. and an Ontario Steel employee, has been named to the committee of the Canadian U.A.W.

presently plugging for a reduction in Canadian car prices. Committee members claim Ford Canada is selling 400 cars a month in the Buffalo area at U.S. prices, which are lower than prices charged for the same cars in Canada.

The committee was prepared to go to Ottawa with a brief, but the call for a Nov. 8 election spoiled their chances to get it on the floor of the house. "Unless there has

been a reduction in prices when the new government is formed after Nov. 8, we'll still be going to Ottawa to outline our ideas, no matter what party is in power," Mr. Caputo said this week.

The eight-man committee will also be lobbying Labor Minister McEachern about the Canada-U.S. Auto Tariff Plan, as it has already denounced his transitional assistance benefits for workers laid off by the trade program.

Mr. Caputo has also been named to the U.A.W.'s Independent Automotive Parts and Suppliers Council, and recently attended an all-day hearing with U.S. senators and congressmen in Washington.

# Speaker Stresses Co-operation At Board-Teacher Program

Mrs. J. Watson, secretary and field director of the Ontario School Trustees' and Ratepayers' Association, keyed a gathering of staff members, hosted by the Milton Public School Board Sept. 13 in Knox Sunday School. Mrs. Watson emphasized the need of boards and staffs to work together.

"It is imperative we work together more closely and wisely than ever before. We have no alternative but to succeed. The children go through our schools only once and then they go out into the space age," the speaker stressed.

**Major Changes**

Mrs. Watson reviewed the tremendous changes taking place in education and likened it to the renaissance of the 16th century. She acknowledged the existence of problem areas like grade 13, teacher education and curriculum development but suggested there had been significant

improvement in developing usable, marketable skills in high school students.

The speaker was introduced by supervising principal E. W. Foster and thanked by board vice-chairman H. P. Johnson. Chairman Alex Cooke presided for the dinner and brief meeting.

**Introduce Staff**

Principals Morrison, Clow, Long and Bell introduced the members of the teaching staff and trustee Cooke introduced the board members.

Inspector W. L. McNeil conveyed greetings from the Department of Education and outlined the fall program of workshops and seminars mainly centred around Milton. He called on teachers to continually improve.
