

Villagers Win Intermediate "C" Championship Capture Tenth O.B.A. Title in Thirteen Years

Campbellville won their fourth Intermediate "C" Championship and their tenth Ontario Intermediate title in 13 years as they overcame Thornton by a 14-1 score in Campbellville on Sunday.

The weather was cold and raw, but the villagers' bats were red hot as they pounded out 15 hits including a home run and four doubles.

Roberts Goes Distance
Jack Roberts went all the way for the Champions, allowing one run off four hits. He walked one and struck out eight. Thornton used Wardle and Shannon on the mound and as well as allowing 15 hits, they walked two and hit a batter.

The first inning set the pattern for the game. Roberts struck out the side and then Dredge led off for Campbellville by striking out, but Ken Moore tied into the first ball thrown to him and drove a line drive home run over the right field fence. Wingrove then doubled, Henderson stole second, and Cairns doubled in both runners to give Campbellville a 3-0 lead.

With one out in the second, Roberts walked Johnston on four straight pitches. This was to be the only walk of the series issued by Campbellville pitchers and turned out to be the only run scored by Thornton as singles by Laycock and Johnston scored on an infield out.

Wingrove was safe on an error in the third and Henderson singled him to third and then

stole second. Cairns' single drove in one run and Don Joyce's long sacrifice fly drove in another to make it 5-1 for Campbellville.

Stretches Lead
The fifth saw Campbellville stretch their lead to 10-1 as they scored five times on a walk, Henderson's single, a hit batter, another long sacrifice fly by Joyce as the stocky catcher for a second time in the game, just missed a homer, Elliott's single

and doubles by King and Dredge. Campbellville kept up the every other inning pattern as they completed their scoring with four more tallies in the seventh. The runs were produced by a walk, a sacrifice and consecutive singles by Moore, Wingrove, Henderson and Cairns.

Laycock, Patterson, Wardle, and Scantlon each singled for Thornton. Stan Henderson had four hits for Campbellville as he was on base five times. Earl Cairns hit a double and two singles as he too was on five times. Ken Moore homered and singled, Al Wingrove doubled and singled, Elmer Dredge and Stu King doubled and Bill Elliott and Harry Zullerons singled.

Footnotes: Ken Moore's first inning homer was not only his first home run of the season but was his 500th hit in senior ball with Campbellville as he joined Stan Henderson, Al Wingrove and Earl Cairns in this select group.

Late in the game, Campbellville substituted liberally as their whole roster saw action with the exception of Harry Hamilton, who had pitched the previous day. Ray Grisold ran for Henderson and scored a run. Larry McPhail took over at third for the veteran Campbellville slugger, Harry Zullerons singled for Elliott in the eighth, Art Brooke popped out for King and George Chester took over at second in the ninth with John Nicholson in right and Peter Andrews catching.

Campbellville played errorless ball with Stu King coming up with eight assists and one put out. Elmer Dredge pulled the fielding gem of the day as he went far into the hole to his right to throw out Shannon in the fourth.

Campbellville must now pick up their series with Hamilton for the county championship. They are one game down in the best-of-five series.

Executive Works Behind Scenes

Merchants Hope to Start Practices Around October 11 in Streetsville

Tentative plans to start practices in Streetsville around the 11th of October would give the 1965-66 edition of the Milton Merchant Hockey Club nearly three weeks to skate into shape before they start their league schedule.

So far the club executive has been working behind the scenes trying to get things organized before practices start. Top item on the problem pole is the signing of a coach. Enio Scelizzi has been asked to return as the head man but so far, he has been reluctant to accept.

Because of the expected late arrival of ice at the arena, the Merchants will be forced to hold all of their pre-season practices out of town. They now have promises of available ice time in both Acton and Streetsville. Club manager Alan Parton reported this week, "we'll be on the ice in Streetsville as soon as possible and they say there's a chance that ice will be ready around the 11th of October."

Plenty of Prospects
As of now, it is expected that everyone who skated with the Merchants last year will be back for another try and in addition, several hot prospects will be trying to crack the line-up. The Merchants finished the regular

season in the second division but improved tremendously in the playoffs and earned the right to advance to the league finals.

Such 1964-65 stars as Lakeview imports Frank Marchiori, Paul Legee and Joe Hore are all expected to be back in uniform. Oakville performers Brian Bond and Dave Prentice, who played an important part in the team's playoff success, will probably be around for the first practice and they'll bring with them a pair of high scoring team-mates, Don Desmond, a nifty wingman and Jeff Ellis, who led the Tri-County Juvenile league in scoring last year.

Three Milton skaters, Roger Wildfong and Leon Stiekle, who played with the Merchants last year and Rotary Midget graduate Doug Hearn, had try-outs with the Hamilton Red Wings but are now back in town. They are expected to perform with the local contingent this winter.

Craig Brush, who played a few games with the Juniors last year, will try out with them and it is expected the sharpshooting forward will earn a spot. Goal-tender Bob Lee, who manned the pipes for the Rotary Midgets, is expected to attend practices and he'll probably play behind Frank Marchiori. It's possible Pete Stemman will also be back to contest the goaltending job.

Generally speaking, there seems to be plenty of good players to choose from, but since only four or possibly five imports will be allowed, the most difficult task will be choosing the ones who can help the most.

Manager Parton suggested, "we'll invite all over-age Midget and Juvenile players to come out and try out with us."

Bantams Ousted
Milton's last hopes for a second O.B.A. title this year ended on Saturday when Penetang came up with a 9-1 win to oust the Milton Bantams from the O.B.A. semifinals. Milton Juveniles won an O.B.A. title last week.

The Bantams captured the first game in the best of three series but dropped the second game 16-3 before losing Saturday. The Milton Fall Fair on Saturday forced Milton to schedule the final game of the series in Georgetown.

Penetang took the lead in the game with five runs in the third inning, added two in the eighth and two more in the ninth. Milton's only run came in the fourth.

Danny Evans singled twice and Ken Parton, Mike McGrath and Martin O'Neill each singled once for the losers.
