18 More Feet

Approve Widening of Mill St.

Mill St. will be widened 18 feet and paved with movable curbs installed in an area on the north side from the driveway of Milton Lumber, east to Milton Welding, Milton Councillors agreed Monday. Estimated cost of the project is \$3,500.

Cement curbing will be installed at the corner of Garden Lane and Mill St. with movable curbing installed along the balance of the area, allowing entrances to existing properties.

The town-owned right-of-way for the road extends 18 ft. north of the present - travelled portion of the road. Members agreed the entire width would be paved to facilitate parking along the street.

Nix Angle Parking
Considerable discussion took place on whether the full width should be paved, on the need for provision of future sidewalk, of the merits of movable curbing as opposed to permanent curbing, of the merits of asphalt curbing to cement curbing. The possibility of angle parking, if the road was widened, was ruled out when it was pointed out the cars would protrude over the present travelled portion of the road.

Councillor C. Renefy cautioned members to review finances before taking on this unbudgeted project. Works superintendent Bruce McKerr pointed out work on repairing a badly broken section of Ontario St. was estimated

at \$3,000 to provide for the required excavation and rebuilding. This was not included in the budget, he explained.

Members turned to consideration of the budget as the clerk-

manager warned annexation costs would be up over the estimate. A new accounting machine at \$6,000 had been approved by council, and the Bell St. sewer was well over the estimate.

Council agreed, however, to the Mill St. widening project with the cost not to exceed \$3,500, half of which would be paid by the Department of Highways.

The defending champions made the trip with only one pitcher as Jack Roberts was unable to get off work, but Hamilton rose to the occasion as he struck out nine, hit one batter, and didn't issue a single walk.

Goes Distance

Don Johnston for Thornton went all the way in the losing cause as he gave up four runs off nine hits. He walked one and struck out nine.

Campbellville actually won the game in the first inning when with one out Moore singled and went to second on Wingrove's single. Cairns' single scored Moore and sent Wingrove to third from where he scored on a passed ball to make it 2-0.

Score in Fifth

Campbellville left one on in the second, two on in the third, went down in order in the fourth and then came to life in the fifth when four consecutive singles by Wingrove, Cairns, Henderson and Elliot produced two more runs to make it 4-0. Johnston then tightened down again and took Campbellville in order in the sixth, seventh and eighth and left Hamilton stranded on second after his single and a sacrifice in

the ninth. Hamilton had been having little trouble with the Thornton attack. A hit batter was the only base runner in the first three innings. An error, a stolen base and a passed ball allowed a man to third in the fourth and then Thornton's third base runner, Bob Broley, who singled in the sixth was out stealing second. One more man got on in the eighth by virtue of an error but he died on first.

Only One Hit

Shortstop Bob Broley got Thornton's only hit. Al Wingrove, Stan Henderson and Earl Cairns each had two singles for Campbellville as Ken Moore, Bill Elliot and Harry Hamilton hit one each.

The game was played in one hour and fifty minutes in brisk weather in the wide open field at the Barrie fairgrounds.

Seek Grants

A by-law seeking grants for anticipated expenditures on roads, in excess of the original budget, was approved Monday by Milton Council. The by-law outlined anticipated expenditures of \$18,000 for snow clearing, asphalt patching on Ontario St., ditch clearing and \$6,500 for the acquisition of property to widen Main St. between Ontario and Bruce.
