Toc Alpha Plans Conference Here

Between 150 and 200 teenagers from Toronto, Guelph, Galt, Hamilton and surrounding districts will attend a two day Toc Alpha conference in Milton on October 15 and 16. Teenagers from Milton and Georgetown will host the conference, to be held in St. Paul's United Church. During the two day affair the problems of teenage drinking will be discussed. About 100 of the teenagers will be billeted in Milton, Terry Deslaurier reports. The conference is interdenominational.

Labor to Boycott Company's Products

Last week the Executive Board of the 9000-member Oakville and District Labour Council formulated an Executive Board recommendation to be recommended later this month to all delegates at the regular monthly meeting for October.

The recommendation reads as follows: "Be it resolved that all affiliated Local Unions to the Oakville and District Labour Council go on record to boycott British American Oil Company products, and be it further resolved that all Unionists in South Peel and Halton County return Credit Cards for B-A products immediately to the British American Oil Company, and be it further resolved that organized labour promulgate such action(s) within circle of acquaintances and relations."

The recommendation was sparked by the present strike of the Labour Council's affiliated Local Union of the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers International Union representing the hourly paid employees in the Clarkson B-A Refinery. The strike is now entering the third week at the Clarkson installation of B-A.

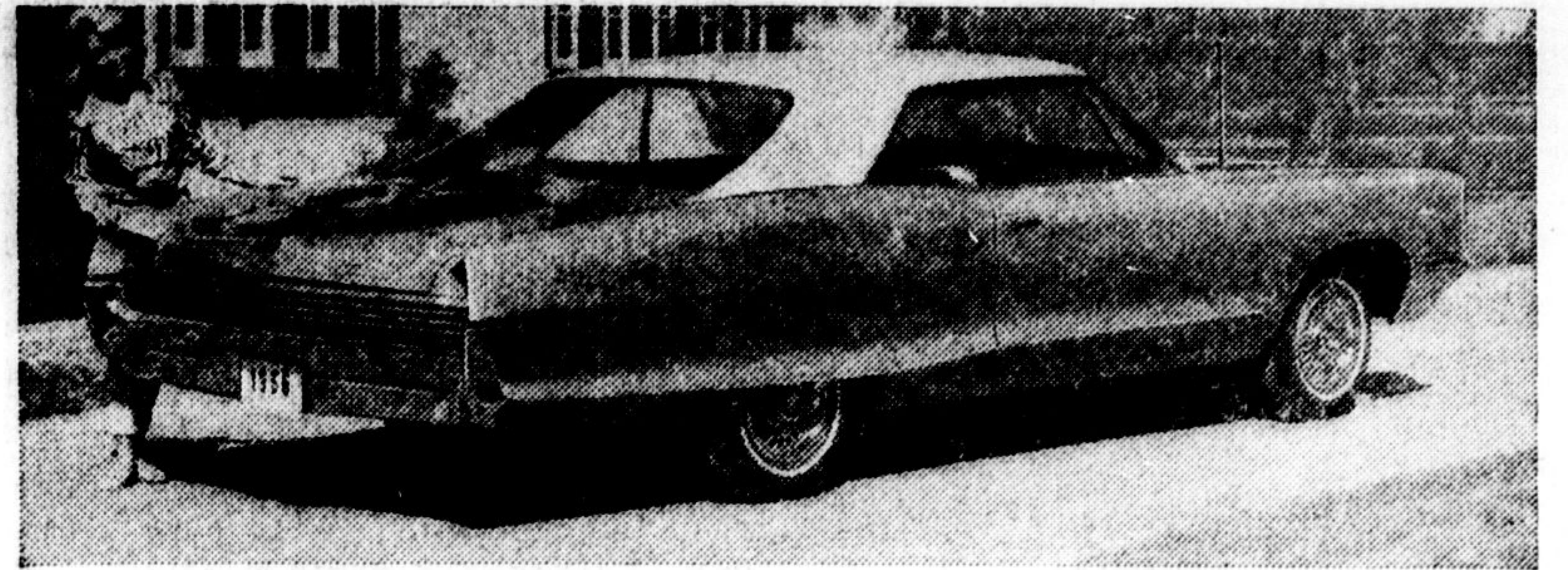

RE LIQUOR LICENCE ACT VOTE

THE MUNICIPALITY OF TOWN OF MILTON

Public notice is hereby given, that in accordance with the provisions of The Liquor Licence Act, and in pursuance of a by-law passed by municipal council of the Town of Milton on the 12th day of July, 1965, I require the presence of the voters at the Town Hall in the Town of Milton on the Fourth Day of October, 1965, at one o'clock in the afternoon, Daylight Saving Time, at which time I will announce the names of the persons appointed to act for the Affirmative and for the Negative respectively upon the poll to be holden under Section 72 of The Liquor Licence Act, upon the following questions.

Are you in favour of the sale of liquor under a dining lounge licence for consumption with meals on licenced premises? **Are you in favour of the sale of liquor under a lounge licence for consumption on licenced premises?**

And notice is further given that the vote will be taken upon the same questions, in the manner provided by law at a poll to be opened on the
