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

Public notice is hereby given, that in accordance with the provisions of The Liquor Licence Act, and in pursuance of a by-law passed by municipal council of the Town of Milton on the 12th day of July, 1965, I require the presence of the voters at the Town Hall in the Town of Milton on the Fourth Day of October, 1965, at one o'clock in the afternoon, Daylight Saving Time, at which time I will announce the names of the persons appointed to act for the Affirmative and for the Negative respectively upon the poll to be holden under Section 72 of The Liquor Licence Act, upon the following questions.

Are you in favour of the sale of liquor under a lounge licence for consumption on licensed premises?

- Those not on the enumerator's lists, but who are qualified to vote, may be vouched for at the poll by someone who is on the list, and sworn as provided in The Election Act.
