

JANUARY 19, 1966 is the release date for two new stamps featuring the floral emblems and armorial bearings of the provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta. The prairie lily was chosen as Saskatchewan's floral emblem in 1941. This stamp is printed in brown, green and orange. Alberta adopted the wild rose as its official emblem in 1930. Tones of red and green were used to print this stamp.

Mass Tuberculosis Survey In All Halton in February

Stamp Display

Stamp collectors will be interested in a new design of Canadian postage stamps, now on display at the Milton office of Halton and Peel Trust and Savings, Main St. at Charles St. Everyone is invited to look over the display.

Plans are being laid for a mass tuberculosis detection survey in Halton beginning in February 1966. Rev. M. Estabrooks has been appointed general chairman of the Survey Committee. H. Brearley of the Halton Tuberculosis Association says "The Halton Association in co-operation with the Ontario Department of Health, will be conducting a tuberculin testing and x-ray survey of Halton County (including x-rays of all industrial employees).

Mr. Brearley added the fact that the testing will be used. "The Department has trained three special teams of registered nurses in leaf testing, an absolutely painless method of administering the test."

The tuberculin test will indicate if any person has ever been in direct contact with tuberculosis. It will not show active disease, but all persons who show a reaction will be x-rayed and people 40 years of age and over will have a chest x-ray. It is in this age group that the highest rate of other lung and chest abnormalities is located. The chest x-ray is capable of finding lung and chest area tumors, enlarged heart etc.

The mass x-ray involves a great number of volunteer workers.

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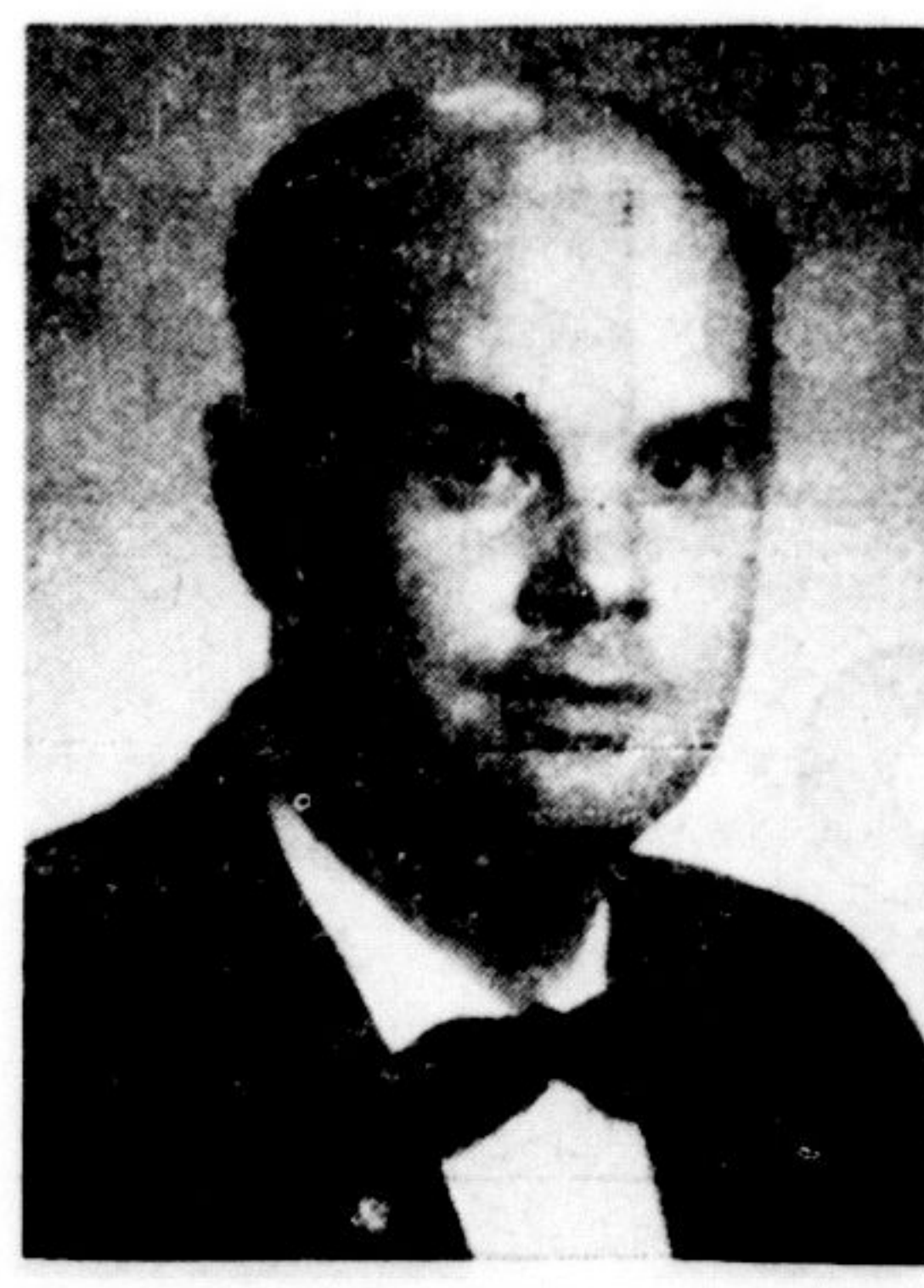


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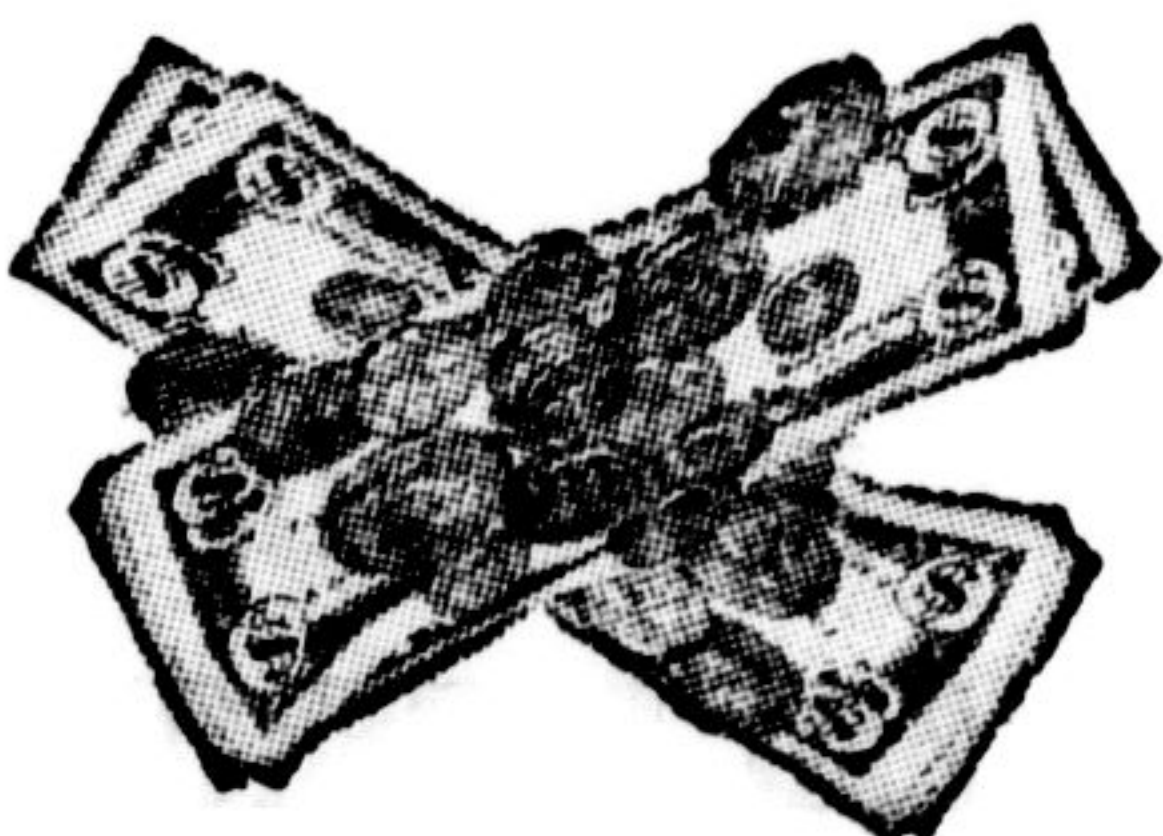
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
