Planning Appointments Bring Heated Discussion

"Planning is the most important thing to take place in Nassagaweya this year," Deputy-Reeve William Hoey charged at the inaugural meeting of Nassagaweya Council on Monday, and set the stage for more than an hour and one half of discussion on appointments to the Township Planning Board.

A combined suggestion from the two new members of the council, Deputy-Reeve Hoey and councillor Mrs. Anne MacArthur, that the Planning Board membership be increased from four to six members was approved. Coun. MacArthur pointed out there are five voting regions in the Township and suggested each region should be represented on the Planning Board. Members of council, after a brief discussion, agreed to increase the size of the board but when it came to appointing members there was a great difference of opinion.

New Members
Alex Near, a member of the board in 1965, has still two years to serve and Stuart Cramp, also a member in 1965, has one more year to serve. After many suggestions had been forwarded Maurice Newton and Gordon Agnew were appointed to the board for three year terms, 1965 Planning Board chairman Grant Campbell was re-appointed for a two-year term, and Bill Lowrie was appointed for a one-year term.

Councillor MacArthur expressed great dissatisfaction with the

action and the results turned in by the 1965 Planning Board and said fresh blood was needed on the board to "spur it to greater achievements".

Deputy-Reeve Hoey also took shots at the 1965 board and said, "I don't think it did a good job." Mr. Hoey was displeased with the decision of the 1965 council to hire professional planners at a cost of \$5,900 and said, "we need people from Nassagaweya with an interest in planning — not professional people from Toronto." He said the increase in the size of the Planning Board would give better representation to each area and suggested the increased size would also promote better cooperation between the Planning Board and council.

Seeks Balance
Reeve Coulter agreed to the increase in the size of the group, but said it was important to have "a reasonable balance of new members with old members."

Although he agreed with the need for reasonable balance, Mr. Hoey reported, "I can't see appointing persons for three years who have done nothing but raise 109 objections from ratepayers." Appointments to council committees for the year were; road committee, councillors Hoey, Gordon; property and building, councillors Gordon, Hoey; assessment and planning, councillors Mahon, MacArthur; finance and welfare, councillors MacArthur and Mahon; personnel and office administration, Hoey and Gordon; property and building, councillors Gordon and Hoey.

Percy McGillivray and Nelson Howard were appointed pound keepers, J. E. Parsons and Arthur Norrish were appointed livestock inspectors, Stanley Norrish was appointed school attendance inspector and Ed Cairns, James Robertson, George Dredge and Charles Lasby were named fence viewers.

Nassagaweya Council

Grants 10 Per Cent Raises

Increases in pay of about 10 per cent were granted to most employees of the Township of Nassagaweya when Township council reviewed the salaries of its employees at its inaugural meeting of 1966 on Monday. Although all members agreed that annual increases are a good thing, there was a general concern about the size of the raises.

Deputy-Reeve William Hoey suggested, "I don't question the need for increases but I wonder if we are giving enough of a raise and if we are going about it in the right way. I think we're doing this entirely too haphazardly — there needs to be more study than just picking figures out of a hat."

Reeve William Coulter explained that at present the Township didn't have a salary scale but the basic salaries and increases are usually based on a slightly lower figure that that used at the county level.

After discussing the problem at great length it was understood that increases in the general area of 10 per cent would be granted this year and it was hinted that the possibility of setting up a scale for salaries and for increases would be considered early in the new year.

Township road department employees were put into three classes, grader operators, truck drivers and laborers. Grader operat-

ors received a raise to \$2 per hour while truck drivers were raised to \$1.90 per hour and laborers are to receive \$1.70 per hour. It was also agreed to pay time and a half for overtime over the ordinary 45 hour week. Speaking for overtime for the road department employees, councillor Mrs. Anne MacArthur said, "I don't think I'd like to be out to midnight and after for much less than \$3 an hour, and I don't think those men should have to either."

Assistant clerk Mrs. V. Cochran received a \$275 raise and Township Clerk J. C. MacIntyre received an increase of \$400 plus an additional \$100 per year for car allowance, bringing his car allowance figure for the year to \$500.

It was decided to review recently-appointed Mac Anderson's salary after he completed six months as assessor. Again this year it was agreed that the reeve, deputy-reeve and councillors would receive \$15 per meeting. Road department superintendent Grant McMillan was also granted an increase of about 10 per cent.

Nassagaweya Briefs . . .

During their marathon five and one-half hour inaugural meeting for 1966 Monday, Nassagaweya councillors:

- Agreed to renew membership in the Ontario Good Roads Association for 1966.
- Renewed membership in the Ontario Association for Rural Municipalities.
- Received requests from the Canadian Mental Health Association, The Muscular Dystrophy Association and the Canadian Medical Alert Foundation, for consideration of grants from the Township. Councillors decided to refrain from making any decision concerning the grants until a list of Associations receiving grants from the county can be obtained.
- Learned approval had been granted for grants totalling \$1,138 from the Federal and Provincial Governments as their share towards a phase of Nassagaweya's Centennial Project. The grants covered improvements to be made at parks in Eden Mills and Campbellville. Previous grants had been approved for a park site adjacent to the new Municipal Building in Brookville.
- Instructed the clerk to send

a letter to thank Rev. W. A. Lehman of Ebenezer Church, "for his kind words, at our inaugural meeting."

- Agreed to have road department employees paid every two weeks, with the work week to end on Wednesdays.
- Authorized the borrowing of \$175,000 at an interest rate of 6 per cent to cover expenditures until taxes are received.
- Heard councillor Mrs. Anne MacArthur report, "I'm about to investigate the blasting damage being done by quarries in the Township. The new councillor suggested considerable damage has been caused by blasting and reported when all the complaints have been tabulated "we'll have enough proof to try to have something done about this."
- Instructed the clerk to send a letter of appreciation to Dr. and Mrs. B. D. Young for the "lovely oil painting" which they donated to the new Township Building.
- Congratulated clerk-treasurer J. C. MacIntyre for his hard work which resulted in cutting down on the tax arrears within the township.
