

## Still Finalizing Annexation Boundaries

Finalization of annexation boundaries for the town will not be achieved until surveyors establish a boundary line on the north and east, although the original proposal of the Ontario Municipal Board will be followed.

In a letter to Milton Council Monday, solicitor D. A. McConachie, Q.C. noted there was no difficulty in defining the area west of Highway 25 north of the Base Line Road. It was, however, proposed that the line be extended to

the east boundary of Highway 25 rather than the centre line to avoid conflict in jurisdiction.

### Jagged Line

The boundary north of the Base Line road, east of 25 creates more difficulty. It is proposed that

boundary extend north far enough to include the Cities Service and B.A. garages but jog down to exclude the house and barn on the farm of Edwin Harrop. This is proposed to avoid assessment problems that would develop if the line passed through an existing building.

On the east, the Plaza Shopping Centre has been included and the solicitor proposed that a distance of at least 50 feet be included at the rear of the stores.

Members agreed to consider the proposals and discuss them next week.

### Put in Order

When the boundaries have been surveyed they will be incorporated in the necessary Ontario Municipal Board order.

Councillor B. Best underlined the importance of planning protection north of the proposed boundary in Esqueving, since the township has no Planning Board and no approval is required for land separations. The solicitor recommended that Milton apply, in the formal order, for a term prohibiting land separations without the approval of the Milton Planning Board, pending the final decision of the Board.

## Fire in Dryer Burns Gas Line

A fire that began in a clothes dryer at Milton Laundromat, Mill St. Sunday afternoon, spread to an outdoor natural gas line and set it afire, causing minor damage.

The fire was quickly extinguished when Milton Firefighters arrived and shut off the gas supply entering the building. Firefighters said the flames apparently began in one of the large clothes dryers and spread through an exhaust system to the outside of the building, where the gas line caught fire. The men report there must have been a small leak in the gas line, for it to catch fire.

Later Sunday afternoon the fire department received a distress call when a child fell from a chair and began to choke. However on arrival at the Mountainview Drive home a doctor was treating the child and the resuscitation equipment was not needed.

Town office records show just one birth and 114 deaths were recorded within Milton's boundaries during 1965. (The birth figure does not include those born at the Milton District Hospital as the building is actually in Oakville, and births must be registered at that town's office).

## Recreation, Parks Boards Purchase Ball Equipment

Lighting equipment for minor ball has been purchased jointly by the Milton Recreation Committee and the Milton Parks Board of Management with installation planned for the spring.

The action followed a joint meeting of the two groups, called to establish clear lines of responsibility in dealing with parks and recreation. The lighting equipment was purchased from 1965 funds of the two boards and in 1966 the installation and cost of poles will be budgeted.

### Ball Park Next

Members of Parks Board recently reviewed progress at the sanitary land fill site between Commercial St. and Williams Ave., south of Parkway Dr. It is expected development of park areas including a major baseball diamond in that area may begin in the spring of 1966. Development would proceed as the land fill operations progress.

At a meeting of the Parks Board last week members reviewed efforts to gather sketches of surveys on the various town park properties.

**Trees Diseased**  
The problem of elm disease in the trees in Victoria Park and the necessity of removal of some of the trees was outlined by E. B. Clements. He noted discussions with Dept. of Agriculture officials suggested treatment of the trees would be impractical. Since some trees have been infected the disease often travels in the root system and it was doubtful if any would survive. Costs for the removal of the already infected trees were to be obtained for inclusion in the budget.

Members considered the advantages of naming some of the parks that are now simply designated as blocks. Suitable names were sought.

Joint policy statement defining the areas of interest of the Parks Board and the Recreation Committee was reviewed to maintain

harmony between the two groups. It was approved in principle as outlined.

## Survey all in February

## Launch County-Wide TB Survey

Plans are being laid for a Halton-wide mass tuberculosis detection survey beginning in February, 1966. Rev. M. Estabrooks has been appointed general chairman of the survey committee.

The Halton County Tuberculosis Association in co-operation with the Ontario Department of Health, will be conducting a tuberculin testing and x-ray survey of Halton County (including x-rays of all industrial employees).

H. A. Brearley, president of the Association, notes "The tuberculosis picture in Ontario cannot be taken too lightly. It is a constant battle to keep the incidence rate under control. Currently, approximately five people per day enter Ontario's sanatoria, 70 per cent of whom are in an advanced stage of tuberculosis. It is only through the efforts of the public that we can hope to keep these figures down, and Halton is prepared to

offer its citizens the opportunity of being part of this international fight against tuberculosis."

### Use Patch Test

Mr. Brearley added that the relatively new "Heat" method of patch testing will be used. "The department has trained three special teams of registered nurses in Heat testing, an absolutely painless method of administering the test."

The tuberculin test will indicate if any person has ever been in direct contact with tuberculosis. It will not show active disease, but all persons who show a reaction will be x-rayed and people 40 years of age and over will be advised that they too should have a chest x-ray. It is in this age group that the highest rate of other lung and chest abnormalities is located.
