

332 Donors for Red Cross Blood Clinic

The semi-annual Red Cross blood donor clinic conducted at the Milton Legion Hall on Thursday afternoon and evening of last week tied an existing record for attendance, as 332 donors arrived and donated 295 pints of blood.

There were an unusually large number of rejects at the clinic (37) and officials explained a new standard of haemoglobin was responsible for most of the rejected donors.

Near 1963 Record

The previous record attendance was set at the January, 1963, clinic when 332 donors gave 325 pints of blood. The total number of bottles of blood collected Thursday was the third highest total to date for the Milton and district clinic.

Clinic convener Paul Kent of the Milton Red Cross branch expressed his gratitude to all the donors, and especially to the volunteers who worked on organizing and running the successful clinic. Mr. Kent is vice-president of the Milton Red Cross.

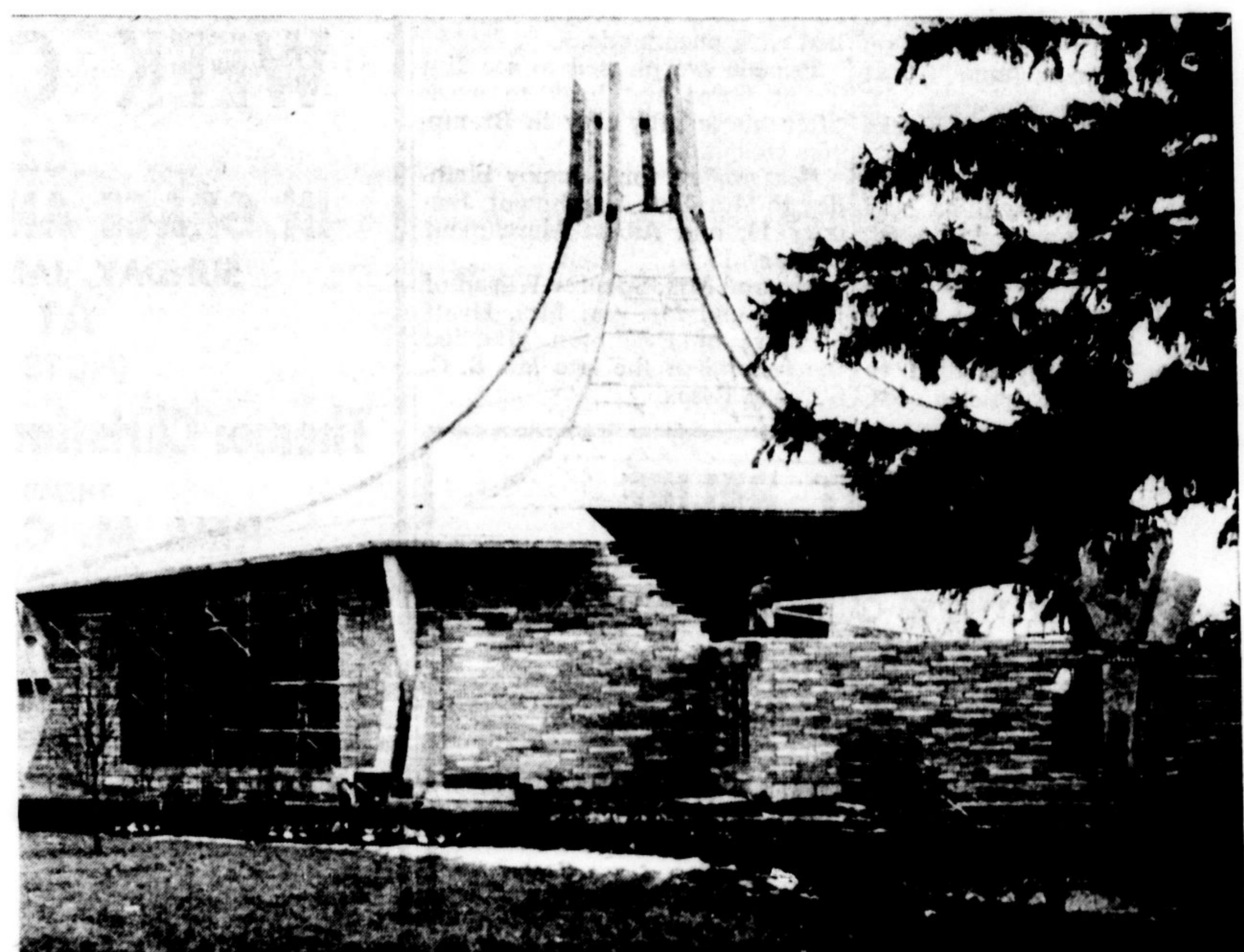

FAVORABLE WEATHER FOR CONSTRUCTION during the past month has been the big factor in the steady progress being made on the new \$400,000 Roman Catholic Church on Martin Street. Contractor Harm Schulthuis reported construction was as much as six weeks behind schedule at one time, but due to the favorable weather two weeks has been made up, he said. The imposing structure on the church property just north of the CPR crossing, is now slated to be completed in June. About 98 tons of brick are being used in the construction of the building which will seat 800 parishioners. The outside brick work is nearly completed now and work on the doors will begin within a week. Sixteen men are currently working on the project and Mr. Schulthuis said, "I'm really pleased with the progress".

Membership has climbed 25,000 in the past four years, and it continues to increase. The scope of Legion activities today would astound some of the founding members who sat at the Unity Conference in Winnipeg in 1925.

In those days the Legion — necessarily so — was oriented exclusively towards veterans and dependents. There was a great deal to be done. While veterans and dependents remain the Legion's prime concern, in the past decade it has made phenomenal strides in community service.

For instance, its low-rental housing projects for elderly Canadians now exceed \$5 million in value. Youth is served through \$160,000 a year in scholarships and bursaries, and some 13,000 boys belong to Legion-sponsored scouts and cubs. Thousands more are accommodated through hockey, baseball and other team sports.

The Legion's most imaginative program in recent years is now known around the world. It involves the training of track and field coaches at an annual national clinic which has become recognized as one of the world's greatest. To date some 800 courses have been given to coaches and 50,000 young Canadians have benefited.

As a centennial project, the Legion has embarked on an equally ambitious program: it is raising one million dollars so that it can continue to provide a high standard of service to Canadians.

The program of the next decade may be even more far reaching than those of the past 10 years. Already the Legion is developing a pilot scheme of scholarships for

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children of Nigerian veterans. It contributes over \$12,000 a year to the British Commonwealth Ex-Services League, most of which is earmarked for welfare amongst veterans in developing countries.

In the council of commonwealth veterans, the Royal Canadian Legion is looked to for leadership just as it is looked to on the corner sandlot or the local cinder track. Like many 40-year-olds, the Legion feels at home in either situation.

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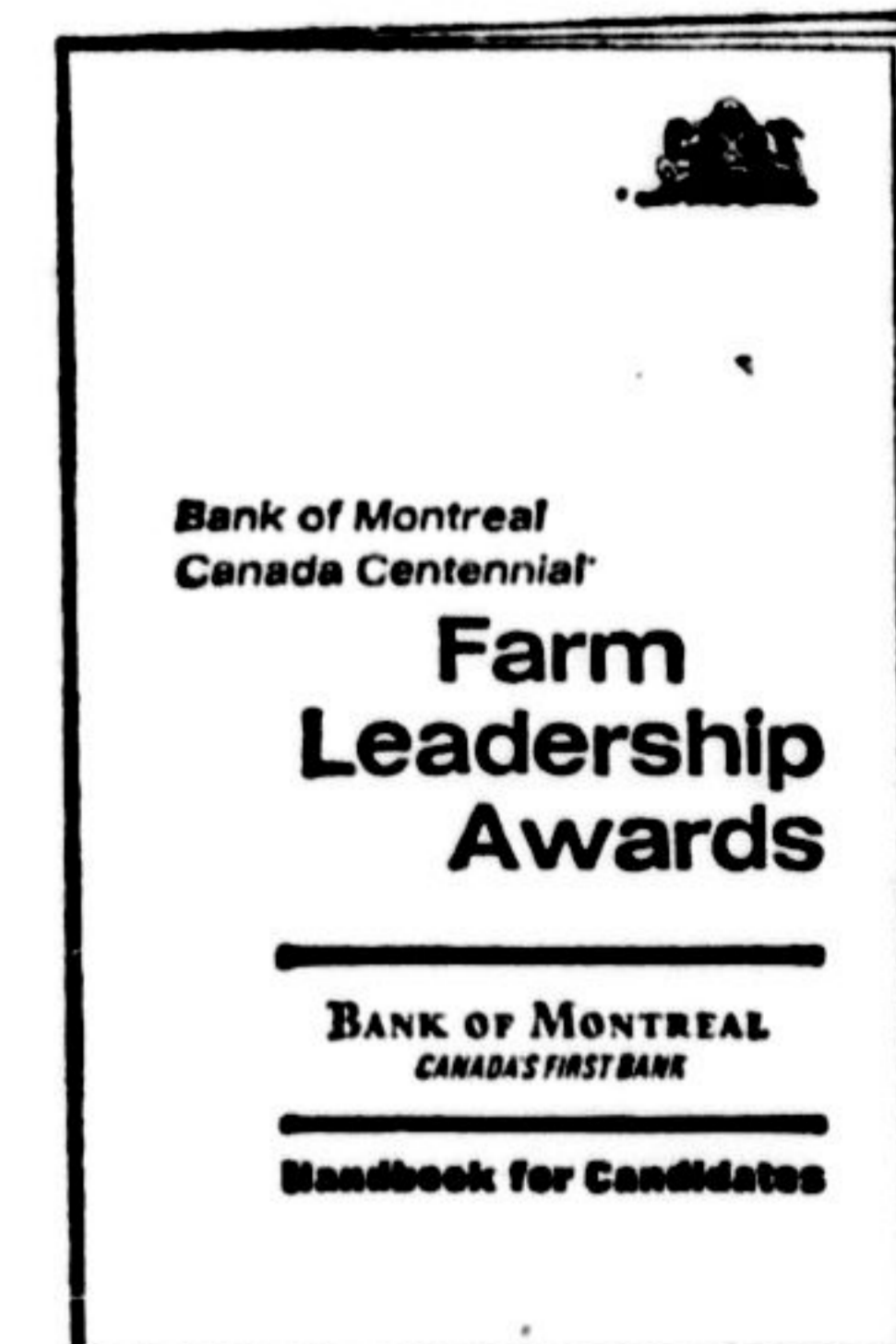
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
