# UAW Council Approves Wage Parity for Canada

The highest policy body in the UAW in Canada gave its approval recently to the union's own 'centennial project': wage parity for Canadians in the North American auto industry in 1967 negotiations.

Canada - U.S. Automotive Trade Agreement, which had its first anniversary in January, removes the last barrier to wage parity.

The council also approved the recommendation of Canadian UAW director George Burt that the union approach the auto comp-

panies to ask that joint study committees be set up immediately on such problems as parity, company-wide bargaining, job displacements and other matters raising out of the auto trade pact, as well as the impact of the new Canada Pension Plan on existing plant pensions.

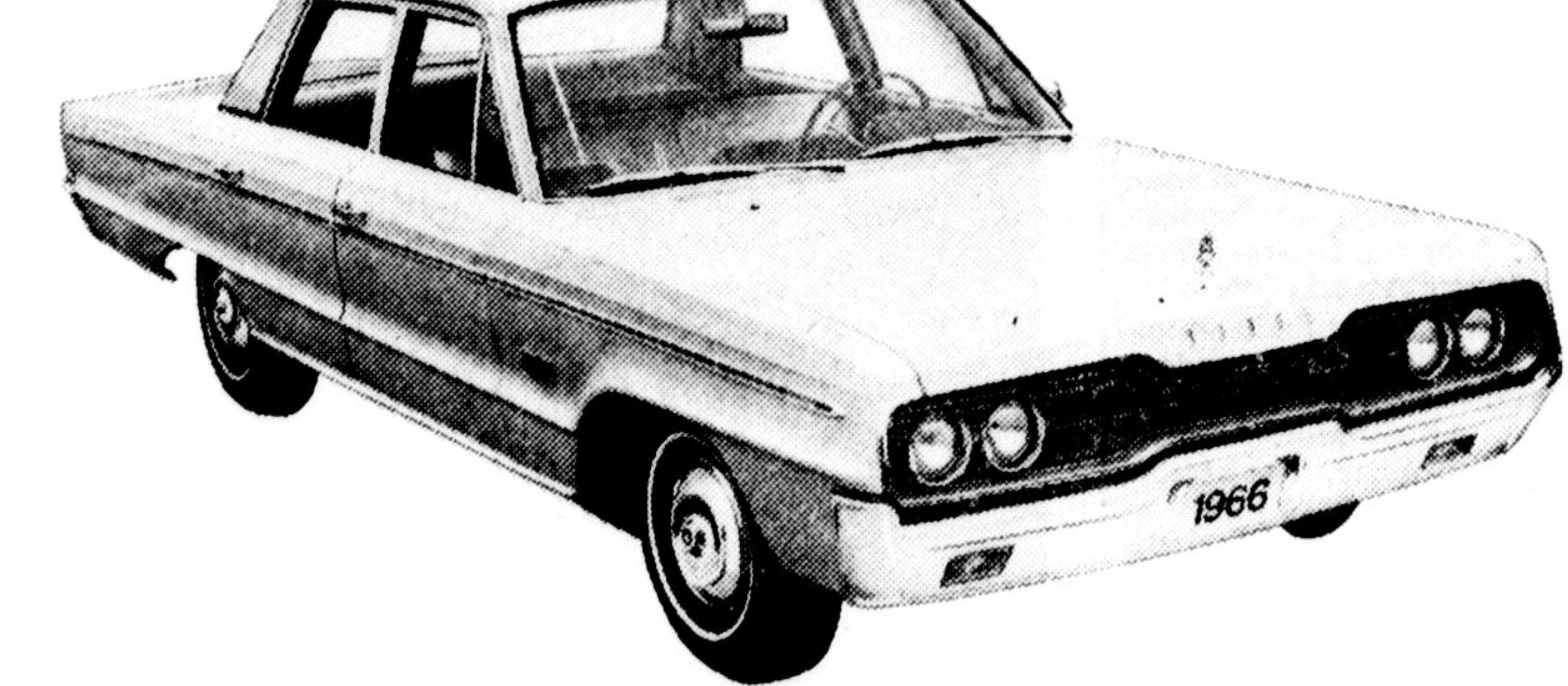
