Milton Police investigated three minor accidents this week with property damage estimated at \$95. No injuries resulted from any of the accidents.

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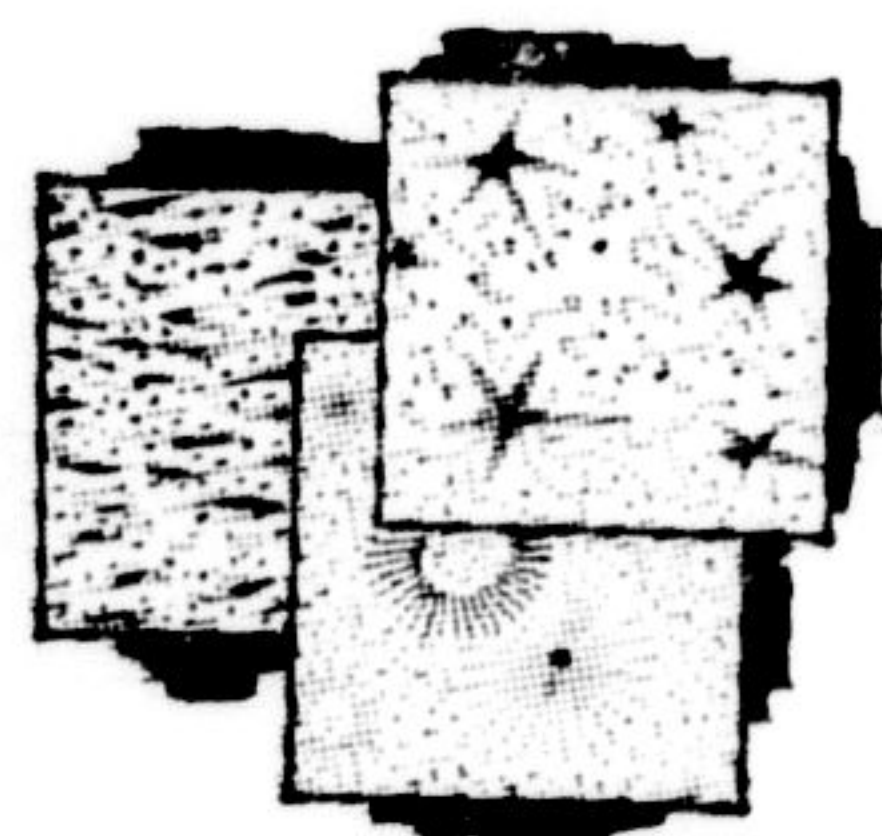
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
