

Harvesters Final Frame Rally Results in Thrilling 4-3 Victory

Milton Harvester Juveniles rapped in three goals in the final period as they came from behind to topple Ferguson in the first game of the Tri-County "B" final series.

The thrilling 4-3 victory in Ferguson on Thursday evening put the Harvesters in the driver's seat in the best of three series for the championship and for the right to represent Tri-County in O.M.H.A. Juvenile "B" playdown action.

Goals by Jim Cole in the first period and Jerry Duncan, Bill Weston and Richard Clement in the third period, boosted Stu Hannani's performers to the victory.

Ferguson took a 1-0 lead in the opening stanza and then Jim Cole scored unassisted to tie the count. A Ferguson tally later in the period and another marker in the second stanza gave home-towners

a commanding 3-1 lead at the end of the second period.

Maurice Miljour set up Jerry Duncan at 2:27 to get the Harvesters started on the comeback trail. Eleven minutes later Bill Weston converted passes from Richard Clement and Jim Cole to tie the score and a minute and 40 seconds remaining in the game. Caughill, one of Milton's strongest performers, was forced to leave the game and sub-goaltender Alan Gilbert finished up.

Milton manager Bill Rollins reports it was a clean, hard fought contest. Only two penalties were issued, one to each team.

OBITUARY

Mrs. F. W. Hayward

A car accident near Milton on February 4 claimed the life of a Lowville woman who was known as a dedicated worker in her church, her community and her home. Mrs. Mary Hayward died in Milton District Hospital on Friday afternoon, February 11, just a week after a two-car collision on 10 Sideroad near Milton.

The wife of F. William Hayward, R.R. 2, Milton, her death brought sadness to friends in the Lowville community, in the Lowville United Church, and in United Church Women's groups across the county. She was unit leader for the Lowville U.C.W., a delegate to the Halton Presbytery of the United Church and a member of the Presbytery's Missionary and Maintenance Committee.

On Friday, the day of her death, she was to have assumed office as president of the Halton Presbytery U.C.W. at their annual meeting in Milton.

Contributed Much

"Her enthusiasm and influence were felt by us all. She contributed much to the work of the presbytery," said Rev. A. K. Griffiths, minister of Lowville United Church.

Born in Galt, Mrs. Hayward was educated and married there. The Haywards moved to Lowville in 1953. She is survived by her husband and two daughters, Mrs. Chester Marlett (Nancy) of Toronto and Mrs. Charles McDonald (Janet) of Hamilton, also two sisters, Mrs. Iva Hinan of Peterborough and Miss Ethel Hamill of Galt.

Rev. Griffiths conducted the funeral service at Lowville United Church on Monday afternoon, February 14, using as his text an inaugural address Mrs. Hayward was to have given to the Halton Presbytery U.C.W. on Friday afternoon. He was assisted in the service by Rev. J. L. Graham of St. Paul's United Church Milton, representative of the Halton Presbytery as its past chairman.
