During its regular weekly meeting Monday, Milton Council:

- Was advised by the solicitor the town could not buy property and continue a mortgage on it without approval of the Ontario Municipal Board. The normal procedure is to debenture capital costs. He also outlined the detailed requirements for the town to acquire industrial acreage.

- Indicated it was not interested in Burlington-Oakville proposals to establish a joint airport. The Burlington clerk extended an invitation to the Mayor to discuss current proposals on the project. Councillor B. Best noted Oakville town manager K. Needham had been quoted as saying earlier that Milton couldn't afford to pay its share anyway.

- Directed a letter to Rev. J. L. Graham expressing council's appreciation for his conduct of the second annual municipal church service on Sunday.

- Was advised by Deputy Reeve C. Menely he would be unable to meet with the public school board on their budget this week. He urged the mayor and other members of the finance committee to proceed without him.

- Noted last year the town budget was approved on March 22. Deputy Reeve Menely explained that the school boards had not yet been received and the treasurer explained equalization figures required from the auditor were also not available.

- Authorized the proclamation of daylight saving time from 2 a.m. April 24 to 2 a.m. October 30.

- Authorized Mrs. T. Parker from the municipal office staff to attend a meeting of the Oakville Welfare Group in Guelph.

- Called for recommendations from the parks committee and parks board detailing the specific

Mrs. Richard Cairns of 325 Kingsleigh Court was hospitalized with multiple lacerations early Saturday morning when a car driven by her husband was in collision with a vehicle driven by Donald Haggart of R.R. 3, Milton. Mrs. Cairns was taken to Milton District Hospital in the Milton Fire Department utility van. Hospital officials described her as being in good condition and expect she will be released from hospital within "a few days".

The car driven by Mr. Cairns was proceeding north on Martin St. at about 12.15 a.m. when a car driven by Mr. Haggart attempted to pass it, Police said. The car skidded on slippery pavement and struck the Cairns vehicle, which in turn struck a tree. Damage to the Cairns car was estimated at \$1,800. The Haggart car received \$125 damage, police said.
