The brief proposed an area bounded on the south west by the Spencer watershed, on the west by the Grand river basin, on the north by the watershed to Georgian Bay, and on the east by the present Metropolitan Region Conservation Authority.

Town planner E. Cumming suggested the Oakville plan was based on the area under municipal planning jurisdiction coinciding with the area of municipal administration. It was also suggested the geographic area which accommodates the most practical system of municipal services was more significant than a unit which enjoyed social and economic cohesion.

Watershed Basis

The brief also submitted that the watershed or group of watersheds should provide the basis for a new municipal unit to permunicipalities downstream to participate in the development upstream that could result in pol-


