Credit Authority

Silvercreek Dam Down on List Start Control at Headwaters

"We haven't forgotten Georgetown, but it only makes good sense to follow a plan," chairman R. K. McMillan told a delegation from Georgetown Council at the April meeting of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. "Further engineering is being done on the first project at Orangeville and we should have something definite in about eight to ten weeks."

Fred Harrison and Weldon Emmerson of Georgetown requested information on the planned dam at Silvercreek. Mr. Emmerson said "Georgetown draws water from wells near the proposed dam site and is fortunate in having a plentiful supply, but we would like to know if this dam would be built in the near future. We wouldn't want to be in the position of some of the other municipalities in the area and have to refuse building permits for lack of water."

Orangeville First

Mr. McMillan explained that Orangeville is first on the list and it is imperative that the start in water control be at the headwaters of the river. He said

that a meeting in the near future with provincial authorities would clear up any misunderstanding of future assistance from Ontario in flood control plans.

"I can only underline the sense of frustration the CVCA felt when federal government help was refused," R. R. Parker, Acton, said. Mr. Parker is chairman of the flood control advisory board of the Authority. "We must do a satisfactory job above Georgetown to control the quantity and quality of the water."

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New Conservation Area
A new multiple-use conservation area will open this month one mile north of Orangeville. With the blessing of the Town of Orangeville and the Township of Mono, both participating municipalities, the area will be called Monora Conservation Area.

Camping, picnicking and swimming facilities will be available. Trees are being planted in the area at the present time, gravel is being placed on the parking lot, and the entrance road will be ready for traffic in the near future.

Superintendent Norman McMahon has been arranging life-guards for the swimming areas and it is hoped that swimming classes will be conducted again at Terra Cotta Conservation Area. Last year, there were 13 graduates from the swimming classes conducted by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.

River Obstructions

In reply to questions from Caledon Township representative Edward Black, the Authority agreed to investigate obstructions in the Credit River in the Orangeville - Caledon area.

Camping Rates Same

Camping rates in the Terra Cotta and Monora Conservation Areas will remain the same as last year at \$1 per night. Daily parking fees have been raised to 75 cents per day and season tickets to \$7.50 per year. The conservation areas at Terra Cotta and Belfountain opened for the benefit of fishermen on April 30.

Ponds have been stocked at Terra Cotta and the fishing is excellent. The river in the Belfountain area was stocked with trout last fall and should supply good fishing for the enthusiast.

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School Addition, Delegation, Dump On Busy Esquing Council Agenda

Esquing Township council Monday of last week waded through a busy agenda approving a five-room addition at Speyside school, hearing a two-man delegation regarding roads and discussing the problem of the Esquing dumpsite.

The five-room addition which had received tentative approval at a special school board meeting the previous Friday was authorized by council pending final approval by the Ontario Municipal Board and Department of Education.

Councillor Tom Hill objected to the high cost of covering garbage at the township dump and wondered if council was paying \$177 per month for covering garbage for other than township ratepayers. He suggested someone should be in charge at the gate to determine where garbage is coming from but this was ruled out due to the cost.

Reeve Leslie pointed out a man would have to be at the gate from the early hours of the morning 'til after dark. He also stated if the gates were locked, garbage would be strewn along the township roads.

Council appointed Thomas McLean, R.R. 5, Milton as building inspector at an annual salary of \$300 plus \$200 car allowance plus 80 per cent of building permit fees collected.

Dump Problem

Supporting a petition signed by over 220 taxpayers, Joseph Duffield and Sam Adams attended council meeting requesting reconstruction of the 27 sideroad (Silvercreek Sideroad) between lot 27 and 28. Mr. Duffield explained there was a short, steep hill, with a high crest cutting visibility. He also noted a sheer drop on one side left no room for passing other vehicles.

Mr. Adams told council he had been involved in an accident three weeks ago at the site. He noted police measured the travelled section of the road and found it to be only 14 feet wide. The delegates suggested removal of from six to eight feet from the brow of the hill to help visibility.

Councillor George Currie reminded council the base of the road was solid rock and would have to be blasted. At the suggestion of Reeve George Leslie council agreed to have a Highways engineer check the site and obtain an estimated cost for the work.

New Democrats Meet; Speaker Is University Social Worker

A general membership meeting of the Halton New Democrat Party was held on April 27 at the Galaxy Club in Oakville.

Speaker for the evening was Dr. Farina of the University of Toronto School of Social Work.

In addressing the members, Dr. Farina stated that for the first time in human history, man would have an unlimited amount of leisure time—that is, time to pursue his own interests apart from the need to make money. He cited John Kennedy and Winston Churchill as men of independent means who had lived creative lives because they were able to pursue their own interests—the arts, politics and international affairs.

The present system of education, Dr. Farina said, is nothing more than to turn out a high school graduate who is educated not only to earn a liv-

ing, but to enjoy living through the development of his full potential as man.

The place of the government, Dr. Farina stated, was to provide citizens with the widest range of choices for his leisure time activities. The dance, music, art and all creative activities should be looked upon with the same approval as sports activities today.

There existed a lack of coordination among provincial departments regarding recreational and leisure time projects. Dr. Farina said—each department carrying out its own policy without knowing of the programs under way in other departments. He charged that one of the best conservation schemes devised in Ontario—that for the Credit River Valley, had been rejected by the Provincial Government because its basic aim had been recreational activities.
