The resolution has been forwarded to the Federal and Provincial Governments, the Canadian Labour Congress and the Ontario Federation of Labour.

G. G. Heym, president of the council stated, "We are certain that the establishment of a ministry on Water Resources will save Canada's taxpayers untold dollars, especially since so many supported agencies are now operating in this field, and will preserve our national water resources in purity both for the present generations and the generations to come."

Change Requested
An important motion suggesting a change in the capital grants structure from the Provincial government and the lowering of age limits for full day attendance at retarded schools, received the approval of the more than 600 delegates in attendance.

The motion asked that the capital grant for construction of retarded children's schools or additions be increased from 50 per cent of the cost to 80 per cent. It also asked, "following the above increase in capital grants, the age for full day attendance be lowered to eight years; and two years following the lowering of the age limit to eight years, the limit be further lowered to six years."

SAVE RETARDED

Phenylketonuria — a condition in which an otherwise healthy infant cannot digest certain body chemicals which poison the brain — is now being prevented by Canadian family doctors who routinely test newborn infants. Where the condition is detected, the diet is changed and these infants are saved from life-long mental retardation.
