



A PRIZE-WINNING ENTRY by Milton Lions Club at the District "A" convention parade in London Sunday brought a third prize to the club, and loads of publicity for the town of Milton and the annual Steam-Era reunion. Theme of their entry was "Milton, Host Town to the Annual Steam-Era Show" and thousands saw the entry. The Milton entry was comprised of 20 Lions majorettes led by Miss Cathie Hood, 12 marching members of the local Lions Club, a 50 horsepower Rumely tractor operated by Sherwood Hume of town, and the familiar steam-operated calliope loaned through the courtesy of Minnie Thomson Memorial Museum of Stratford. Dave Thompson operated the calliope and his

brother John maintained the necessary 100 lbs. of steam pressure for the entire parade. Of 323 entries, which took three and a half hours to pass a given point, the Milton Lions were honored to receive a third prize and they were interviewed for a local TV program after the parade. Shorthanded Sox "bombed" by Dundas

After turning in fine performances in their first two outings, the shorthanded Milton Red Sox were bombed 10-1 in Dundas on Thursday evening.

Playing with four Juveniles in the line-up, plus a pair of newcomers, the Sox were touched for six runs in the first inning. Mike Boughton started in the mound and was tagged with his second loss of the season. He lasted only two-thirds of the inning and was relieved by Juvenile star Doug Coverdale who hurled the remainder of the four and one-half inning route.

Doug McCutcheon's double and Richard Clement's single accounted for Milton's only safeties off the offerings of Dundas righthander Phil Martino.

30-lot subdivision sought on Bronte St.

A proposal for a 30 lot residential subdivision on Bronte St. north of Heslop Rd. was presented to Milton Council on Monday by Bill Sharpe, solicitor for Kreiger and Moxey, owners of the property, but no action was taken to lift the current "freeze" on subdivisions.

Mr. Sharpe pointed out his clients were willing to increase the capital contributions per lot above the present \$400, and were prepared to negotiate with council.

He explained capital contributions in Burlington were \$400 and are now \$700. In Oakville they range from \$400 to \$600, and in Georgetown they are still \$400.

The builders are interested in starting the subdivision as soon as possible. Lots fronting on Bronte St. are 72 feet while some in the turning area are 50 feet. The area would be served by a dead-end road from Heslop Rd.

Mr. Sharpe noted the 6.32 acre area was on a registered plan of subdivision and had services available from adjoining streets. The developer would also undertake to drain the area adequately.

The area, subject of several previous council discussions,

was reviewed in terms of residential and commercial and the available services.

Deputy Reeve C. Menefy flipped over the enrolment projection for the high school over the next five years, and suggested a capital contribution of \$1,200 or even \$1,500 per lot wouldn't make another development profitable.

Councillor C. Johnson suggested it would be some time before industry could be attracted to Milton while Georgetown was offering serviced industrial land at \$1,000 an acre.

"It appears council is not prepared to commit themselves", Councillor Johnson observed, and the solicitor retired from the meeting.

"The only people who profit from a new subdivision are the developer and the real estate people", Councillor Johnson continued.

"Where are people going to live?" Reeve A. Ledwith asked.

"It's up to the higher forms of government to find some other way of meeting costs like education", Councillor Johnson declared.
