

Even auction bedpan

W.A. June supper party profitable, fun-filled

It was both fun-filled and a profitable evening Wednesday of last week, when the Women's Auxiliary of Milton District Hospital held its annual June supper party and auction sale at the Fourth Line Esqueing home of Mrs. W. H. Merry.

The auction provided both the laughs and the profit. Auctioneer Mrs. Rene Murphy cajoled and harangued an audience of 90 anxious buyers into paying huge sums for an estimated 60 articles. The articles ranged

from a small silver bud vase to a large oil painting and included numerous gift items, antiques, jewellery, flowers, home baking and even leftover decorations from the Auxiliary's recent Maytime Ball.

When the cash was counted up at the end of the evening, organizers learned the auction had brought in \$172.25.

Fun highlight of the evening was the sale of an antique bedpan, which was touted as "the ideal father's day gift." When

the auctioneer caught Hospital Administrator Dalton E. McQuaig bidding on the article, the rumor went through the audience that the hospital must be in short supply on this particular item.

(The Administrator later confided he was thinking about the expensive 30-bed addition and alterations that got underway at the hospital last week, and said he wanted to keep the costs down on new equipment.)

Auctioned items brought prices ranging from 25 cents to about \$6.50. All had been contributed by members attending. Auction conveners were Mrs. E. Alton and Mrs. K. Young.

Earlier in the evening, guests enjoyed a bountiful pot luck dinner prepared under the supervision of convener Mrs. C. A. Martin.

During the business session the two ladies whose idea gave birth to the busy W.A. were honored when president Mrs. J. Conway presented the Auxiliary's first Life Memberships. Mrs. Chester Service and Mrs. F. McNiven decided in 1959 that the hospital needed an Auxiliary, and they called the first meeting November 29, 1959.

Another highlight of the business session was the presentation of a cheque from gift shop convener Mrs. N. Pearce, representing the proceeds of the gift shop for the past year. The cheque was for \$1,500, a record to date.

A blanket was raffled off during the evening and this brought in another \$22.85.

Today P.H.N. works with the health team of the M.O.H., his assistant, the sanitary Inspector, Auxiliary workers for schools, the secretarial staff, and all other agencies concerned with the welfare of the community.

The friendly work of the P.H.N. encompasses prenatal care, family counselling, pre-school examinations, testing and immunizing in schools, cancer detection, young married couples, and the aged.

Miss Coulton charged all as Christians to continue their service of love in the community.

Mrs. Austan Ledwith expressed the appreciation of the group and the meeting closed with prayer. Lunch was served by Mrs. E. Brown.
