WHAT A LOT OF "RUBBISH" On May 26 I wrote to Milton Council, Garbage Dept. what I considered and intended to be a letter containing two helpful constructive suggestions. As this letter has been quoted in part, I enclose a copy in order that it may be printed in full, so that readers might be more fully informed as to what Deputy-Reeve C. Menefy considers to be its "negative" con-

My letter in no way suggested an extra collection, only that householders be more informed about holiday pick-up. That I am not the only citizen in ignorance of the collection schedule following a holiday, was clearly displayed by the fact that following the long weekend in May, garbage was placed outside for removal by all householders in the Court and elsewhere, two or three days before being collected. I do not imply that an extra collection is neccessary - no such "stupidity" entered my mind.

As regards the green plastic bags, I am fully aware that these can be purchased at appropriate stores. I merely suggested an easier availability to workers of the Council bags which are obtained at a special

The original letter follows: Dear Sirs,

I would like to make the following suggestions with regard

to garbage collection. (a) That a notice be issued to housewives, say over a three or six monthly period, showing the collection days immediately following a holiday, with a suggestion that this notice be pinned up on a basement or closet wall where it could be referred to. This would obviate situations such as the present one in Kingsleigh Court whereby the garbage has been put out by all residents since 9 a.m. Wednesday morning, and to the time of writing (Thursday afternoon) is still on display, perhaps a little worse for the time lag, and certainly not a very hygienic state of affairs.

I am aware that notices are put in the local paper to indicate the collections, but as the holidays during the summer months fall on a Monday, and such a notice would appear in the previous Wednesday's issue, it is not too effective. In any case, whether it is done through a circular or through the medium of the paper, I do believe that an advance schedule, with instructions to keep for reference would be the answer.

(b) The green garbage bags are extremely useful, and especially to the working housewife, but the fact that they are only available at the Town Hall from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays somewhat restricts the worker from purchasing. If it were possible for a Main St. store to hold a small stock of these, so that they could be purchased during shopping hours, I am sure this would assist.







## Two weeks' vacation with pay

The Ontario Department of Labour on July 1, 1966, will extend vacation pay benefits to all full time, and regular part time, employees in the Province's general and construction industry. You will be entitled to:

 at least one week's vacation with pay each year for the first three years of employment, payment to be on the basis of at least 2% of your pay for all work done during the vacation year, and

 when you have completed 36 months of continuous or non-continuous employment with the same employer you will be entitled to two weeks' vacation with pay. Payment

will be on the basis of at least 4% of your pay for all work done during the vacation year. How does the plan work?

An employee having four years continuous or non-continuous employment as of July 1, 1966 will qualify for two weeks' vacation with pay providing the employee has not already taken a paid vacation during his fourth year of employment.

An employee commencing work on or after July 1st, 1966, will be entitled to one weeks' paid vacation in 1967-68-69. In 1970 the employee would be entitled to two weeks' vacation with pay.

Two weeks' vacation may be granted successively or divided into two periods of one week each.

Only employees in the construction industry will be required to use the vacation stamp and stamp book method of payment.
