## \$190,433 loan Burlington sewers

Approval of a federal government loan of \$190,433 to the Town of Burlington, to assist in the construction of a sewage treatment project was announced today by the Honorable John R. Nicholson, Minister responsible to Parliament for Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

Made under the terms of the National Housing Act, the loan is for a period of 15 years with interest at 5½ per cent per annum and is based on an estimated cost of \$285,650.

Burlington will construct the second phase of the Dynes Road trunk sewer, which will service some 3,300 acres of industrial and residential property. The NHA loan will assist in the construction of 6,400 feet of 30 and 33-inch trunk collector sewer.

## Federal loan aids aged housing project

Federal Loan aids aged housing project. Approval of a \$563,937 federal government loan to assist in the construction of a housing project for elderly persons in Oakville has been announced by the Hon. John R. Nicholson, Minister responsible to Parliament for Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

Provided under the National Housing Act, the loan will be made to Trafalgar Senior Hom-

es Limited, a company sponsored by the town's Rotary Club. The loan will be repayable over a period of 50 years with interest at 5½ per cent per annum.

The project will consist of 40 one-bedroom and 40 bachelor units, for which housing rents will be \$70 and \$60 per month respectively. This is the third such loan to be made to the company.
