## North Burlington's first library opens at Roy Coulter home

A modest but adequate 15 foot by 20 foot spare room is the new home of North Burlington's first public library.

After continued pleas from North Burlington residents, a small library of about 1,500 books has been established in

the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Coulter. The new service began on Tuesday of last week and the library will be open each Tuesday and Thursday from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m., and each Friday from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Books for people of all ages

and tastes, line three walls of the small room. Mrs. Coulter, who is also acting as librarian, suggested "we have quite a reasonable selection of books — both fiction and non fiction." She pointed out that if a book is not immediately available in the library, she can probably arrange to have a copy brought from one of the town's larger libraries.

The service is free of charge to residents of the town, but the librarian indicated it could be discontinued if enough interest is not shown. "It's really up to the people now, they asked for the service and if they don't use it, it will likely be discontinued," she said.

The Coulters just recently sold their farm on the Guelph Line, just north of St. George's Anglican Church, but provisions have been made in their new home, which is now being built, for the library. In their new home, which they plan to move into in September, a room of about 11 ft. by 22 ft. will be used for the library.

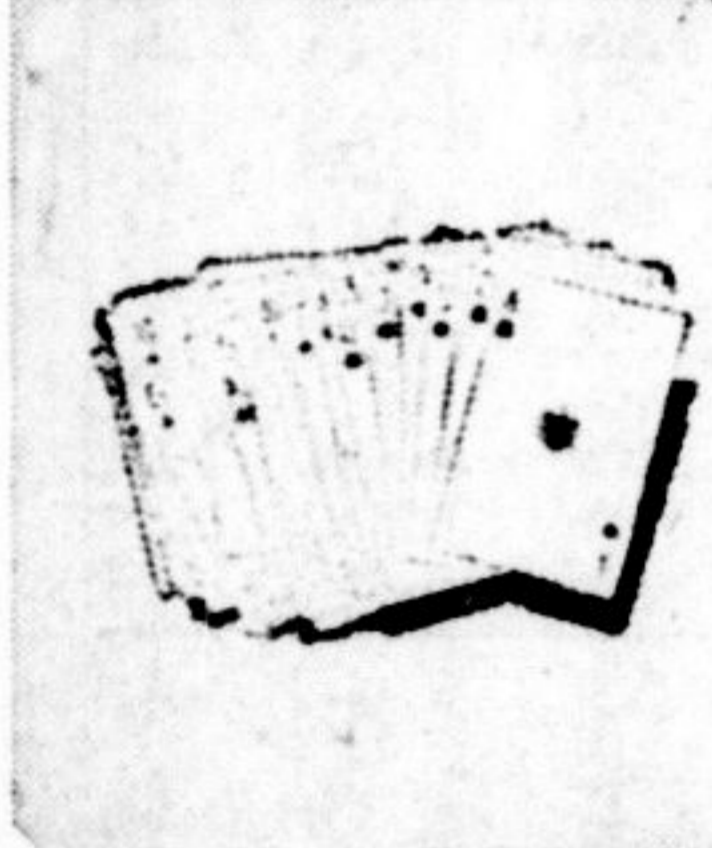

### Let's Play Bridge

The language of contract bridge is full of special names for types of plays that can be made. There is the squeeze, the end play, the upper cut, the Bath coup, the Vienna coup and many more.

Few of these names refer to defensive play, but there are two which are very similar in nature. These are the Deschappelles coup and the Merrimac coup. Both of these involve the sacrifice of a trick, the former to create an entry in partner's hand and the latter to destroy an entry in dummy.

I had occasion to resort to a Merrimac coup in a rubber bridge match last week. Here are the hands with West the dealer and neither side vulnerable.

**North**  
S-8 5 2  
H-K J 10 9 7 5

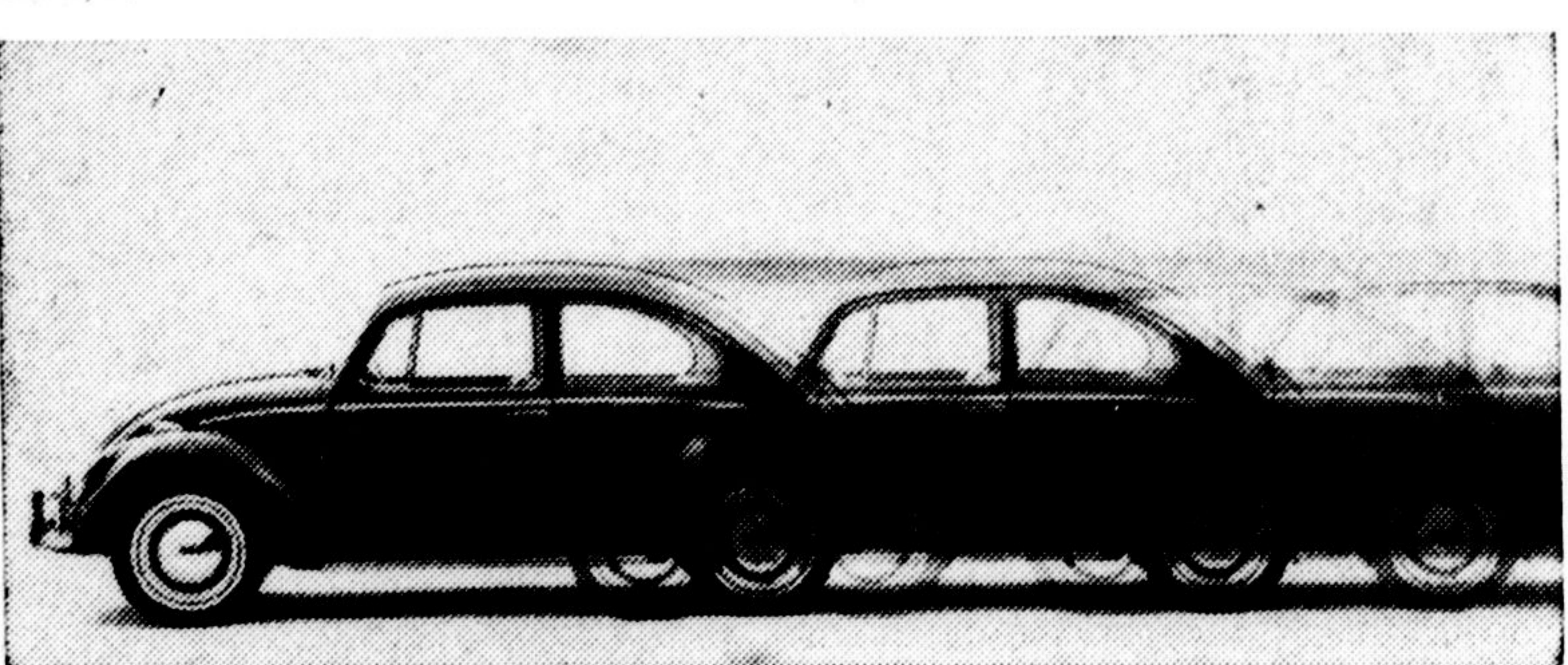

The bidding:  
**West** North East South  
Pass Pass Pass 1D  
Pass 2H Pass 2NT  
Pass 3H Pass 3NT  
All Pass

The only part of the bidding that I wish to defend is East's pass. I held East's cards and a duplicate bridge, I would open this hand every time. But this was rubber bridge and I can afford to pass this kind of hand.

West led the spade ten in an attempt to hit my best suit. This was allowed to ride around to declarer, who won with the jack. Since hearts offer the best chance for tricks, declarer led a heart and played the jack from dummy. East won with the queen.

Now East knows that the diamond queen is not an entry. The thing to do is to knock out dummy's club ace. A low club is no good. Declarer will just win

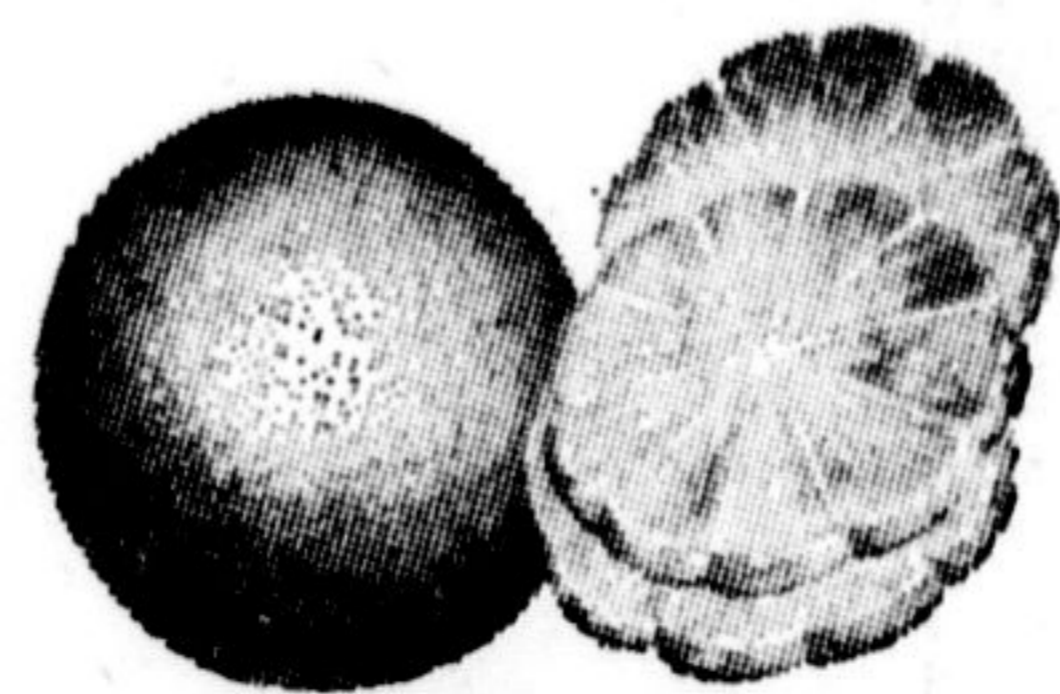
