BACKWARD THINKING BY FEDERAL GOVT.

The proposal to spend some \$283,300 on Brookville school is, to me, history repeating itself. When the Mohawk Raceway came to Nassagaweya, the Council at that time couldn't wait to get their hot little hands on the assessment and build the con-

troversial Municipal Building. Public opinion kept costs down somewhat, and the result is a building that greatly resembles a European type public convenience. All that is lacking is the "Ladies" and "Gentlemen" signs over the respective entrances.

It now appears the School Board can't wait to get their hot little hands on the assessment from the \$400,000 motel to be built near the Mohawk.

I recall that when Brookville school was built, some people, including myself, pointed out that the school obviously wasn't big enough. We were told it was a matter of grants due to backward Federal thinking; it is only possible to use population figures of the past five years when building a school for the future, and the fault is obvious. Immi-

grants are being encouraged to come to Canada, people are re-producing, cities are overflowing into the rural areas, and this inability to project into the future by Federal authorities is having serious repercussions.

I wouldn't doubt the need for extra space, what should be taught should be left to the professional educators, but it seems to me too many people are too anxious to spend other people's money. I wish some informed person would drop a line to The Champion, pointing out what our school would have cost had it been built with these extensions and additions in the first place, and what it will cost by adding a room here and a room there, plus the six room addition now proposed. I would hazard a guess that the extra cost would almost have bought us a new school.
