


### Teen party, adult lessons added to swim pool agenda

### Real fire interrupts brigade fire practice

The brigade took the trucks to the sewage plant at the south end of Fulton St. about 7.30

Thursday evening, planning some ladder practice. On arrival there, they changed their minds and decided to go to the Bruce St. school for the practice.

The trucks had just arrived at the school when a fire call came in and the drivers were notified over the radio communications system. They rushed — guess where—would you believe right back to the sewage plant?

The fire was at Phoenix Manufacturing plant, right next door to the sewage plant where the fire trucks had been moments before the fire broke out. The fire was blamed on sparks from a welding machine which ignited dust on the drying oven. Smoke filled the building but the blaze was brought under control by workmen with hoses.

"They did a great job in putting it out," one firefighter said. When firemen "mopped up" at the Phoenix plant, they stayed in a nearby field to finish the ladder practice they didn't get started earlier.
