EYE EXAM

Small children often have sight defects but because they have never known perfect vision, they cannot explain that they don't see well. While the child may be naturally quite intelligent, he may not be able to see well enough at school to progress with the other children. He should have an eye examination before he starts school and, if advisable, should

CARE FOR FEET

Swelling of the feet may be a symptom of serious diseases, including heart or kidney trouble. It could also have a mechanical cause, through long hours of standing or walking in unsuitable shoes. Some relief may be obtained by soaking the feet and then giving them alternate plunges in hot, then cold water. If the condition continues, medical advice should be obtained.


