## Course for 100 at O.S.D. Milton

More than 100 residence counsellors from across Ontario began a five week course at the Ontario School for the Deaf,

Milton, on Monday morning. Counsellors for the Ontario Schools for the Deaf at Milton and Belleville and the Ontario School for the Blind at Brantford are participating in the five week program that leads to a regular Department of Education certificate.

Wayne Fox, dean of residence at OSD Milton is principal for the course with Arthur Clare as co-principal for a two week period.

About 8 of the future counsellors are living in residence at the school with the balance, from this area, attending the daily sessions.

The lecture and discussion course will cover such subjects as communication, child psychology, residence recreation, outside classroom teaching aids and anatomy of the ear, causes of deafness or structure of the eye and causes of blindness depending on which school the counsellors will serve with.

Lecturers for the course include George Whetstone, assistant superintendent of the School for the Blind at Brantford; Mrs. Marguerite Brown of the Institute of Child Studies at the University of Toronto; Hyalie Bryant, supervising teacher at the OSD Belleville; Dr. Brahan, consulting Child Psychiatrist to OSD Milton and Mrs. Evelyn Chorniak, supervising teacher' at the OSD, Brantford.




