away in the forests, as he was a lonely type, a fact which much grieved his mother. So Hal-Ton-A-Kawi combined his name with "away" to make the name "Nassagaweya".
Tra-Fal was a mute whose only speech was a guttural "gar" so he named his lands "Trafalgar". Daughter Nel-A-Toni was a disappointment to the father, as he had wanted another son, so he combined the first portion of her name with the word "son" to call her lands "Nelson".
And so it was, in the days of long ago, the district of Halton (which, remember-

ing the name of the tribe he fled in his youth, the wise old Indian called a Kown-Tee) was divided into four equal portions — Esquesing, Nassagaweya, Trafalgar and Nelson.
(If any present-day historians try to tell you anything different, please refer them to the writer. I got this straight from an Indian I saw lounging around a cigar store on Main St. the other day.)
For a clue to the manner in which the towns, villages and crossroads developments in Halton were named, you will have to read the second instalment of this column in next week's paper.
