Here's how to say "buffalo" in four other languages . . .

One of the prime purposes of the Halton Region Conservation Authority's buffalo venture was publicity for this area, and the idea is paying off by bringing publicity from near and far.

A language-lesson magazine called "Quinto Lingo"—published in German, French, English, Spanish and Italian like its name implies—recently carried an item on the buffalo herd which will be read (in five languages) by subscribers around the world.

The New York magazine's publishers included the item in a "plant issue" and the theme used in the story was the buffalo would be inexpensive grass-cutters as they would keep the grass short in the 60-acre enclosure where they are to be herded. They were termed "primitive lawn mowers."

(In case you want to see the buffalo and communicate with them in another language the magazine gives some hints. "A herd of buffalo" in German is "dorch eine 'Buffelherde'"; in Italian it's "una mandria di bufali"; in Spanish they're "un rebanado de bufalos"; and in French, "une bande de buffles.")

Seven accidents in town in July

Milton Police investigated seven motor vehicle accidents during July, which caused injuries to one person and a total of \$2,550 in property damages, police reported this week.

The July figures bring the totals for the first seven months of the year to 101 accidents, 10 persons injured and \$24,240 in property damages.

There were just three accidents in town in the past week. Sunday afternoon on Martin St. near the Base Line, a rear-end collision caused \$550 total damage to cars driven by John William Boudreau of 386 Pearl St. and Ronald Leslie Wilson of R.R. 2 Campbellville.

Two minor accidents, each with \$25 damage, were investigated on Thursday of last week.
