Despite the hot weather and poor fishing conditions some fair catches have been made in Southern Ontario. Bass are feeding consistently in hot weather, but they still like the cool of evening or early morning. Dew worms and popping plugs have been the best bait so far. Live minnows trolled slowly or drift fishing often gets good results.

Pickeral fishing has nearly come to a standstill in the North Bay and Parry Sound district and fair to poor in the Kawartha and Rideaus. Lake trout has gone deep and one must troll very deep to get one far this year have been poor in most districts. Pike has been fair.

Yes we have advised in this column before anyone going fishing in new territories this summer would be well advised to learn the laws and regulations as they apply to the area in which they are fishing. No one wants his holidays ruined by taking illegal fish and as always, ignorance of the law is no excuse. Also see if it is permissible to fish with live bait as more and more lakes are forbidding the use of live minnows as bait. This is to stop polluting the lake with unwanted fish such as carp, goldfish, eels and lamprey. Above all, if you value the right to hunt and fish, sup-

port the people and organizations that are trying to manage our natural resources properly. They are not only trying to maintain our heritage, they are trying to improve it. It is now part of your life, too.

From Lake Michigan and Lake Superior comes good news that improved survival of the lake trout following lamprey reduction has resulted in an increase in natural spawning. Chemical treatments have also been resumed in Lake Huron, and 17 lamprey streams were treated this spring near Sault Ste. Marie and St. Ignace. This is a very costly program shared by Canada and the USA and is going to take many, many more years to complete.

Future fish and wildlife management programs of the Department of Land and Forests will be assisted by the conservation-minded members of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters of which the Halton Sportmen's Association is proud to say they belong.

Fishermen who pursue the Walleye through the heat of summer and the cold of winter might be interested in learning more about the personal life of their quarry. First of all the Walleye is called many names, although now officially Walleye, he has been referred to as dore, pikeperch, pike and glassyeye. Anyone who has caught one is familiar with his rugged good looks and delicious flavor, when fresh pan fried. Spawning takes place in early spring as soon as the ice breaks up, in water temperatures of 38-44 degrees. Young Walleyes feed on small organisms, insects and their larvae. As they grow older they turn to small fish for food. Fishing is best for them in May and June, slows down in the heat of summer and improves again in September and October. When in the mood Walleye will strike at Plugs, spoons, minnows or worms. The best success is enjoyed by those who fish early in the morning or late in the evening. To be a successful Walleye fisherman you must fish very close to the bottom when still fishing or trolling. When a school of fish is found it is advisable to anchor and still fish six inches off the bottom. Some of the most popular spots for Walleye are Moon River, Pointe au Baril, Byng Inlet, French River areas of Georgian Bay, Lake Nipissing and several inland lakes in the Pickering and in Ognetawan River Watersheds.

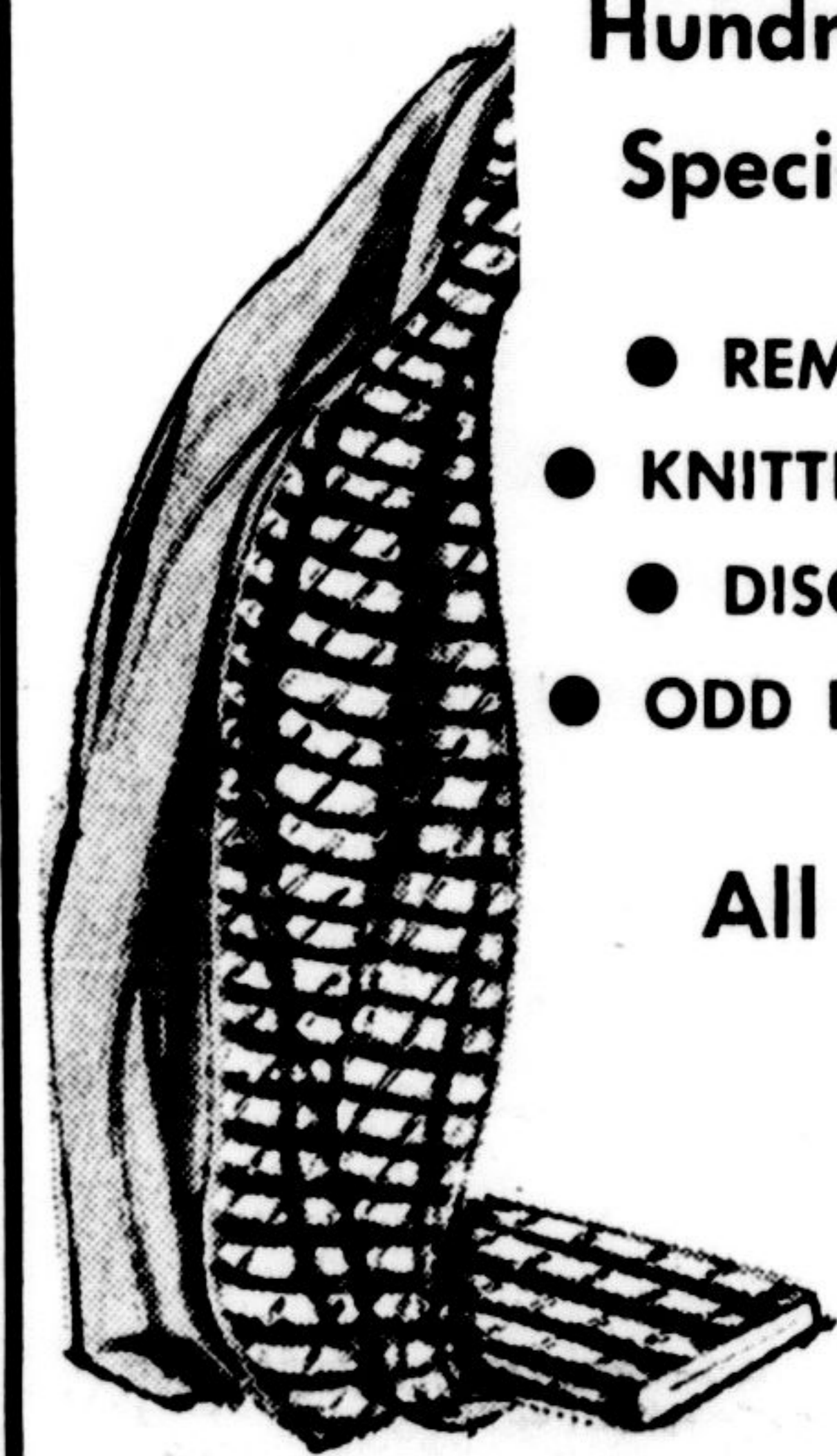
