Stop Red Sox with 7-1 verdict

Campbellville coasted to a 7-1 win over Milton in Campbellville on Sunday, actually winning the game in the first inning when they scored two runs.

Ralph Rintoul, Campbellville's rookie right-hander, pitched his best game since his first appearance against Hamilton in his first start of the season. It was the first time this year that he had gone nine innings. He limited Milton to one unearned run of four hits. He struck out four and walked two. Ron Naylor for Milton also went the distance and he allowed seven runs off nine hits. He walked four and struck out four.

Elmer Dredge led off the bottom of the first with a single and went to second on an infield out and to third when Al Wingrove was safe on an error in the Milton infield. Wingrove stole second and both scored on Earl Cairns' single.

The home team made it 4-0 in the second when they scored two more. Don Joyce was safe on an error, advanced to second when Rick Repto walked. Both were sacrificed on by Rintoul and scored on Ken Moore's single. Milton committed three errors in the third that enabled Campbellville to score again, to make it 5-0. Bill Elliot singled and got all the way around on

subsequent errors. Campbellville made it 6-0 in the fourth when Moore doubled and scored on Wingrove's single.

Milton finally broke out onto the score sheet in the fifth when Marty Schiszzi walked, stole second and scored on an error.

Campbellville scored the final run in the eighth on a well executed hit and run. With Dredge stealing, Moore doubled him home.

All Milton's four hits were singles of the bats of Wayne McConnell, Ron Naylor, Al Jordan and Dave Asseltine. Ken Moore led the Campbellville attack with two doubles and a single and Elmer Dredge, Al Wingrove, Earl Cairns, Bill Elliot, Don Joyce and Ralph Rintoul all singled.

Footnotes: Campbellville's program for this weekend is still uncertain. They may be playing in the OBA. If not, they will try to play Preston in Campbellville. This would be the postponed game from July 1. Only Preston can tie Campbellville for the league championship. They would have to win their two remaining games while Campbellville lost their three remaining ones.

Milton Esso Tykes' bid for a Halton County championship fell five runs short on Saturday. After trampling Brampton 8-4 in the playoff tournament opener in Burlington, the Tykes dropped an 8-3 verdict to Burlington in the championship final.

Righthanders Mike Kaszycki and Wade Bekar shared the pitching chores in the first game.

Milton piled up a 3-0 lead in the first inning as Mark Hyatt singled, Glen Turner walked, Wade Bekar belted a long safety to score two runs and then romped home on an infield out.

A walk to Glen Turner and a pair of errors produced two Milton runs in the third inning and in the sixth the locals closed out their scoring with three runs as Van McPhail doubled, Hugh Campbell walked, Steve McCann singled and Glen Turner singled.

Brampton's only runs were scored in two innings — three in the fifth and one in the seventh. Van McPhail, Mark Hyatt and Mike Kaszycki had Milton's only other hits.

In the championship game Burlington practically wrapped up the decision in the first inning as the home-townners scored three runs in the first, added two in the fourth, one in the fifth and two in the sixth. Mike Kaszycki hurled the route for the losers and showed well against the powerful Brampton squad. Mark Hyatt was a tower strength at second base for Milton.

Kentucky golfer sets records at international union tourney

A United States golfer set competitive course records at the Horny Towers Golf Course Saturday by firing a 68-71-140, four under par, in a 36-hole international union tournament between teams representing four districts of the United Steelworkers of America in the United States and Canada.

Don Robinson, of Louisville, Kentucky, representing USWA District 30, Indianapolis, Ind.,

fired the record breaking round for both 18 and 36 holes at the suburban Toronto layout. He riddled home birdies on the last three holes of his final round to avert disaster after a balky putter sent his score soaring to two over going through the 14th. He had made the turn at one under 35 but three-putted the par four 10th and the par five 11th after missing an eagle put from 12 feet.

Dick Crosby, smooth-swinging "thin man" representing District 31, Chicago, Ill., led his four-man team to the team title by shooting a 73-70-143 in the two-day test. He ran neck-and-neck in the homestretch for the individual honors but finished second to Robinson when he bogied the 16th and 17th. Crosby was four under until this lapse. District 31 shot a team aggregate of 647 for the tournament to win a leg on the union trophy and individual awards.

District 30, captained by Robinson, was second in the team test with a 629 aggregate, followed by District 32, Milwaukee, Wis., with 647 and District 6, Toronto, Canada with 691 strokes.
