Victor J. Norris

Having enjoyed retirement for just over a decade, Victor James Norris of Milton died in Hamilton August 14, after a lengthy illness. He would have celebrated his 83rd birthday on August 25.

Mr. Norris retired from P. L. Robertson Mfg. Co. on July 1, 1956, after 44 years of service in various departments. It was the first and only job he ever took.

At the time of his retirement, he spoke of his intentions to spend more time on his horticultural hobby.

Born August 25, 1883 on a farm on No. 10 sideroad, Esqueving Township, Mr. Norris was one of a family of 12 of the late Mary-Jane Thornton and Charles Norris.

He moved from the farm to another farm below Milton at age 23, going from there to a third farm on what is now Tremaine Road; and from there to the home on King St. which he occupied for 50 years until his death.

On May 24, 1928, he married Annie Jane Martin, and their

family included Melville (Jim) of Milton; Mrs. G. Manuel (Muriel) of Richmond Hill; and Mrs. G. W. Cates (Vera) of Saskatoon. Mr. Norris was an active member of Milton Town Council for eight years; a member of the Session of St. Paul's Church, and later made an honorary member; as well as Superintendent of St. Paul's Sunday School for a number of years.

He was also a member of I.O.O.F., Milton Chapter, Rebekah Lodge No. 79, and charter member of the Milton Horticultural Society.

Surviving are his wife, three children, brothers Maxwell of Milton and Howard of Calgary, and sisters Mrs. William Anderson (Annie) of Milton and Mrs. Elgin Ford (Ella) of Cayuga.

Funeral service was held August 17 from MacNab Funeral Chapel, Milton, with Rev. J. L. Graham officiating.

Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery. Pallbearers included K. M. McDougall, J. Gilbert, Bert Jones of Milton; J. Bell of Moffat; T. Cairns of Hamilton; and G. Manuel of Richmond Hill.

Brother of Milton woman killed in plane accident

A plane accident near Nipigon in Northern Ontario on Sunday, August 14 took the life of Harold Roy Davidson of North Bay, only brother of Mrs. Dorothy Wright of Bronte St. S., Milton.

Mr. Davidson, described as an expert pilot, was returning to Nipigon from Saskatchewan when his light plane, a Cessna 170-B, hit a hydro pole and crashed into a rockcut on the escarpment. Officials said he was attempting to land on Highway 17 and only narrowly missed making a successful landing.

It was raining at the time and visibility was poor due to a heavy fog bank rolling in from nearby Lake Superior.

The 40-year-old pilot was employed by Geophysical Mining of Canada and owned his own business as well. Described as a highly capable technician, he had travelled all over Canada in the course of his work.

Surviving, besides his sister in Milton, are his parents Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Davidson of Hepworth, his wife Maureen and three children. Mrs. Wright attended the funeral service at North Bay on Thursday.

Pete McMullen

One of the best known men in Halton County sports circles, Hugh (Pete) McMullen of Milton died suddenly on August 13 in Milton District Hospital.

Mr. McMullen, born on September 5, 1911, in Esqueving township, was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel McMullen. He was educated in Milton Public School and in 1940 married the former Joyce Maves.

He was district manager for Gooderham and Worts Ltd., of Toronto, but was best known for his connection with service clubs and sports organizations. During his lifetime he was active in the Milton Curling Club, the Milton Kinsmen Club, Royal Canadian Legion, the Milton Lions Club, the German-Canadian Club and the Milton Rotary Club.

After serving 14 years 1944-63 as president of the Halton County Baseball Association and three years as president of the Ontario Baseball Association, he was named as a life member of both associations and also as a life member of the Milton Red Sox Baseball Club. At the time of his death he was the newly-elected president of the Milton Merchant Junior Hockey Club, after serving two terms as a vice-president.

He is survived by his wife, the former Joyce Maves of 235 Ontario St., one daughter Dianne (Mrs. D. Marganti) of Hamilton, two brothers George and William of Milton, and four sisters Kate (Mrs. Beckford) of Brampton, Jackie (Mrs. Percy Hall) of Milton, Caroline (Mrs. Harold McMillan) of Milton and Jean (Mrs. Glen Dulliver) of Rochester, Michigan.

Rev. Dr. T. M. Dustan officiated at the funeral service in Grace Anglican Church, Milton. Interment was at Evergreen Cemetery, Milton.

Organizations represented at the funeral included the Milton Rotary Club, Gooderham and Worts, the Halton County Baseball Association and the Ontario Baseball Association.

Pallbearers were Bus Knight, Dave DeForest, Bob Brush and Neil Loomis, all of Milton, and Ollie Johnson of Oakville and Earl Nicholson of Burlington.
