

# Lay plans for works building check truss, cement type costs

A comparison between cost of constructing a cement block works building and a truss type building is to be made before Milton council decides to proceed on the planned structure, members decided Monday.

Works Superintendent Bruce McKerr outlined to Council the estimated costs of a truss structure 40 feet by 20 feet that could be added to in 20 foot stages. The construction of the building was part of the overall program including renovation of the town hall. Quarters formerly used in the town hall by the works staff are no longer available and a new building was to be built at the treatment plant site.

**Estimated cost of the building** was \$11,316 by one supplier and \$11,448 by another supplier. The building would be erected on footings provided by the town. Electrical, flooring, and other services would be additional.

Councillor C. Johnson asked if comparisons had been made with construction of a cement block building. When he was advised they had not he asked for such a comparison before proceeding further.

Members agreed on seeking such a comparison.

### AMBULANCE QUESTION

Dear Sir:  
Reading The Canadian Champion of August 17, I see there are problems concerning an ambulance. I don't want to criticize, as I am sure everyone did their best in the past, but it seems it didn't work out and Mr. Murray MacBeth wants to quit.

My suggestion is, why should not the town of Milton and area have its own ambulance?

We have firemen and a fire truck and everyone is thankful for this. We know they protect and help us when we need them, and fire can happen anytime to anyone.

The same is true about an ambulance. Anyone could need it sometime and it would be really something for the people of Milton and surroundings to have one. Is it not possible for the Town of Milton to buy an ambulance? Milton has 6200 inhabitants, and that means about 1,500 families. The district would have about the same number, so we should have about 3,000 families interested.

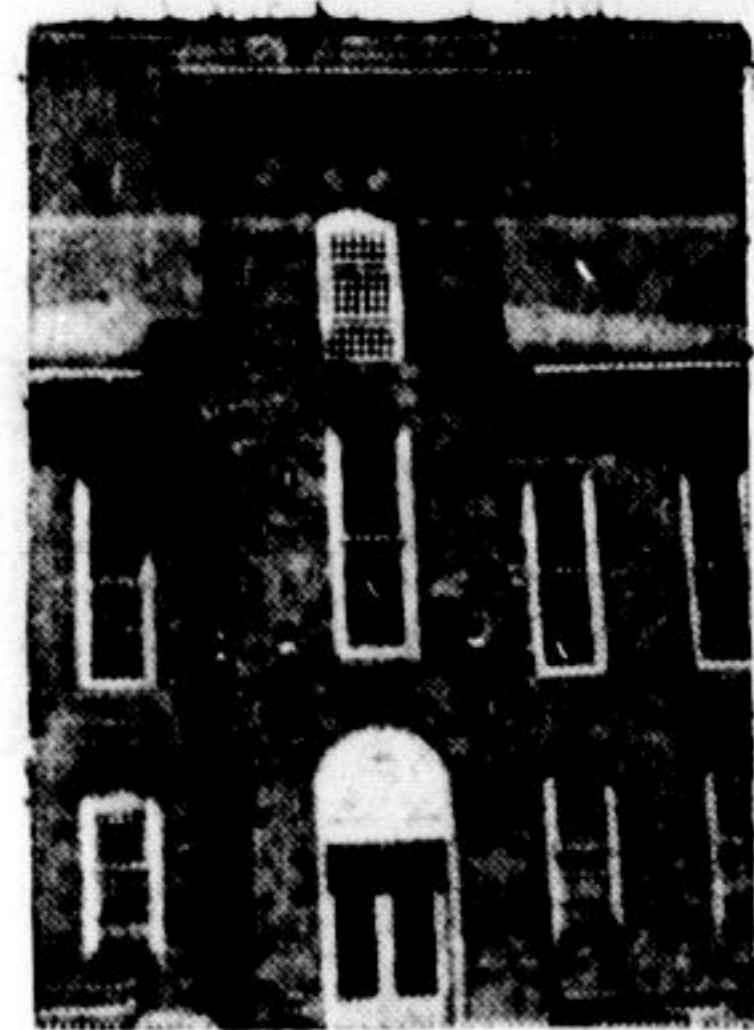
If every family would contribute \$2 for this project, the town would have about \$6,000 to start with. The paper says the town paid \$1,500 last year as subsidy to Alexander Ambulance, so this money would help too. Maybe the families will have to pay another \$2 after three or six months, but I think it can be managed.

What should be the base for the ambulance? Where it belongs — at Milton District Hospital — so people who need it can call the hospital and reach the ambulance at the same time.

In future there will have to be steady men on the job, but I am sure that for a start, the local men of the St. John Ambulance Brigade in association with persons who have first aid training, will organize a team to help out.

I know it is easy for me to write this, and there will be a lot of work to do. But with some good will, when the need is recognized it will be possible.

The town plans to begin making gasoline purchases in bulk with a pump and depot located on the sewage treatment plant site. Estimates place the annual consumption at 20,000 gallons.
