Lay plans for works building check truss, cement type costs

A comparison between cost of constructing a cement block works building and a truss type building is to be made before Milton council decides to proceed on the planned structure, members decided Monday.

Works Superintendent Bruce McKerr outlined to Council the estimated costs of a truss structure 40 feet by 80 feet that could be added to in 20 foot stages. The construction of the building was part of the overall program including renovation of the town hall. Quarters formerly used in the town hall by the works staff are no longer available and a new building was to be built at the treatment plant

The same is true about an ambulance. Anyone could need it sometime and it would be really something for the people of Milton and surroundings to have one Is it not possible for the Town of Milton to buy an ambulance? Milton has 6,200 inhabitants, and that means about 1,500 families. The district would have about the same number, so we should have about 3,000 fam-

If every family would contribute \$2 for this project, the town would have about \$6,000 to start with. The paper says the town paid \$1,500 last year as subsidy to Alexander Ambulance, so this money would help too. Maybe the families will have to pay another \$2 after three or six
