

Thousands of Halton students head back to school on Tuesday

43 teachers on staff

Expecting 1,100 in public schools

More than two months of care-free holidays will become only memories on Tuesday morning when an estimated 1,100 pupils stream into four Milton public schools, for the start of another school year.

A staff of 43 teachers including supervising principal E. W. Foster will be looking after the educational welfare of students at the Martin St. Senior Public School and the J. M. Denyes, W. I. Dick and Bruce St. schools this year.

Nine newcomers to Milton will be joining teaching staffs this year. L. Werner, former music supervisor at Ingersoll, will be music supervisor for all four schools. At the J. M. Denyes school, Mrs. B. Cameron who formerly taught at Maxville, Ontario; Miss G. Lamb, a graduate of Hamilton Teachers' College; G. Cox, a graduate of Hamilton Teachers' College; and A. Brown, a graduate of Stratford Teachers' College will be joining that staff.

Miss P. Short, a graduate of Stratford Teachers' College will be joining the staff of the W. I. Dick School along with Miss S. Hinnells, Miss J. Pollack and J. Flatt, all graduates of Hamilton Teachers' College. Mrs. M. Harcourt (nee Miss M. Clulcy) will be teaching at Bruce St. School again this year. She was married during the summer.

Eight regular classrooms will be in use at the Martin St. Senior Public School while rotary classes will keep a science room, library, home economics and

industrial art rooms busy almost constantly. A new general-purpose room is currently under construction there, and is expected to be ready for use early in the new year.

J. Bell, B.A., is principal of the Senior Public School. Mr. Bell, Mrs. E. Emms and J. Hier will teach grade eight classes. Miss E. Presse will teach the Senior Opportunity class and J. Bosman, R. McCaw, P. Phillips and Miss C. Seabright will be the grade 7 teachers. Mr. Bosman will teach boys' physical education and Miss Seabright will be in charge of girls' P.T. classes. Mr. McCaw will be in charge of Industrial Arts and Mrs. M. Eachern will teach home economics, as well as doing principal's supply. Mrs. K. Gorham will teach art and do principal's supply and D. Boyer will teach French.

R. Morrison is principal of the Bruce St. school and will teach grade six. Seven classrooms will be in use. Mrs. A. MacKay will teach kindergarten, Mrs. M. Harcourt (Miss Clulcy) will teach grade one, Mrs. H. Babcock will teach grade two, Mrs. I. Chase will teach grade three and four, R. Shier will teach four and five and Mrs. M. Glover will teach the Junior Opportunity class. A library, set up in a spare classroom, will also be in use this year.

L. R. Long, B.A., will return as principal at the W. I. Dick school and he will also teach grade six. Mrs. W. Newell will teach kindergarten with Miss P. Short teaching grade one,

Miss S. Hinnells teaching grade 2, Mrs. B. Robinson grade three, Miss J. Pollack grade four and J. Flatt grade five.

At the J. M. Denyes school, W. J. Clow, B.A., B.Ed., will be principal. Mrs. E. Arbie and Mrs. M. Gallaway will be the two kindergarten teachers. There will be three grade one teachers, Mrs. B. Cameron, Mrs. R. Green and Miss M. Trethewey, one more than last year, Mrs. J. Schotfield and Miss G. Lamb will be the grade two teachers. Mrs. P. Copeland and Mrs. I. McDowell will be grade three teachers and G. Cox and Mrs. C. Steward will be grade four teachers. A. Brown and Miss F. Wilson will teach grade five classes and Mrs. G. Robbins and Rieley will teach grade six.

There will be 15 classrooms in use and one classroom will be used for library and music.

The school's maintenance staff is unchanged with R. Waters at the Martin St. School, G. Mills at Bruce St., S. Sherratt at J. M. Denyes and L. Archer at W. I. Dick.

Supervising Principal Foster expects the general purpose room at the Martin St. School will be a valuable addition to the town's educational facilities. The room will be equipped for basketball, volleyball and other sports and as well will be ideal for holding assemblies and concerts.

Mrs. Eileen Martin is the schools' secretary and works from the Martin St. Senior Public School.

Sister Alexander is new principal Holy Rosary School

Approximately 540 pupils will be enrolled for the 1966-67 school year at Holy Rosary Separate School on Tuesday.

Sister M. Alexander, Phil. M. M.A., and a member of the Sisters of St. Joseph, has just been appointed as the school's new principal, replacing Sister M. Antoinette who served in that position for the past six years.

Other newcomers on the staff include Brian Fichaud, Miss Mary Lavelle, Miss Jean Lane, Miss Beverley Weatherdon and Miss Patricia Gleeson.

A new four-room addition to the school is currently being completed and at the time two of the present classrooms will be converted into an auditorium. Dion Boyer, B.A., will be in charge of Oral French again this year.

Variety of courses offered to 700 high school students

Five courses ranging from a five-year arts and science course to a two-year occupational program will be offered to about 700 students on Tuesday when

the doors of Milton District High School open for the start of another school year.

Principal R. C. Hunter and vice-principal W. M. Tom will

head a teaching staff of 34 this year, including seven new staff members.

Those joining the staff are Dennis Buckley, Latin, English, 12E; Miss Carol Corcoran, English, Physical Education, 9B; Edward Loeplich, History, 10C; David Mitchell, Mathematics, 9C; Miss Lana Myndiuk, Commercial, English, 9F; William Pollen, English, 13B; and James Rusk, Geography, 9E.

In all, 30 teaching areas will be in use this year, including 15 regular classrooms, three commercial rooms, four science rooms, three shops, two gyms, one library and two home economics rooms.

The courses being offered are: four-year arts and science; five-year arts and science; four-year business and commerce; four-year science, trades and technology and two-year occupational program. Special Commercial, a one-year course which was held for several years, will not be offered this year. Vice-principal Tom explained, "it wasn't thought to be necessary since the four-year business and commerce course has proven so popular."

Tuesday will be a busy day for both teachers and students. A general staff meeting will be held prior to the assembly in the

school gymnasium. Students will then go to their classrooms where they will receive general instruction and timetable. School buses for rural students will leave at 12 noon. The day however won't be over for teachers as they'll attend another general staff meeting, plus meetings for department heads and new teachers.

Regular classes will begin on Wednesday.

Teachers from the 1965-66 staff who will not be returning this year are P. B. Allmen, L. M. Darby, Mrs. A. L. Eastman, D. O. Hill, E. D. Litt and Mrs. K. E. Rogers. Miss M. Stockton who taught in Milton last year is still on the school staff but will be teaching in West Germany.

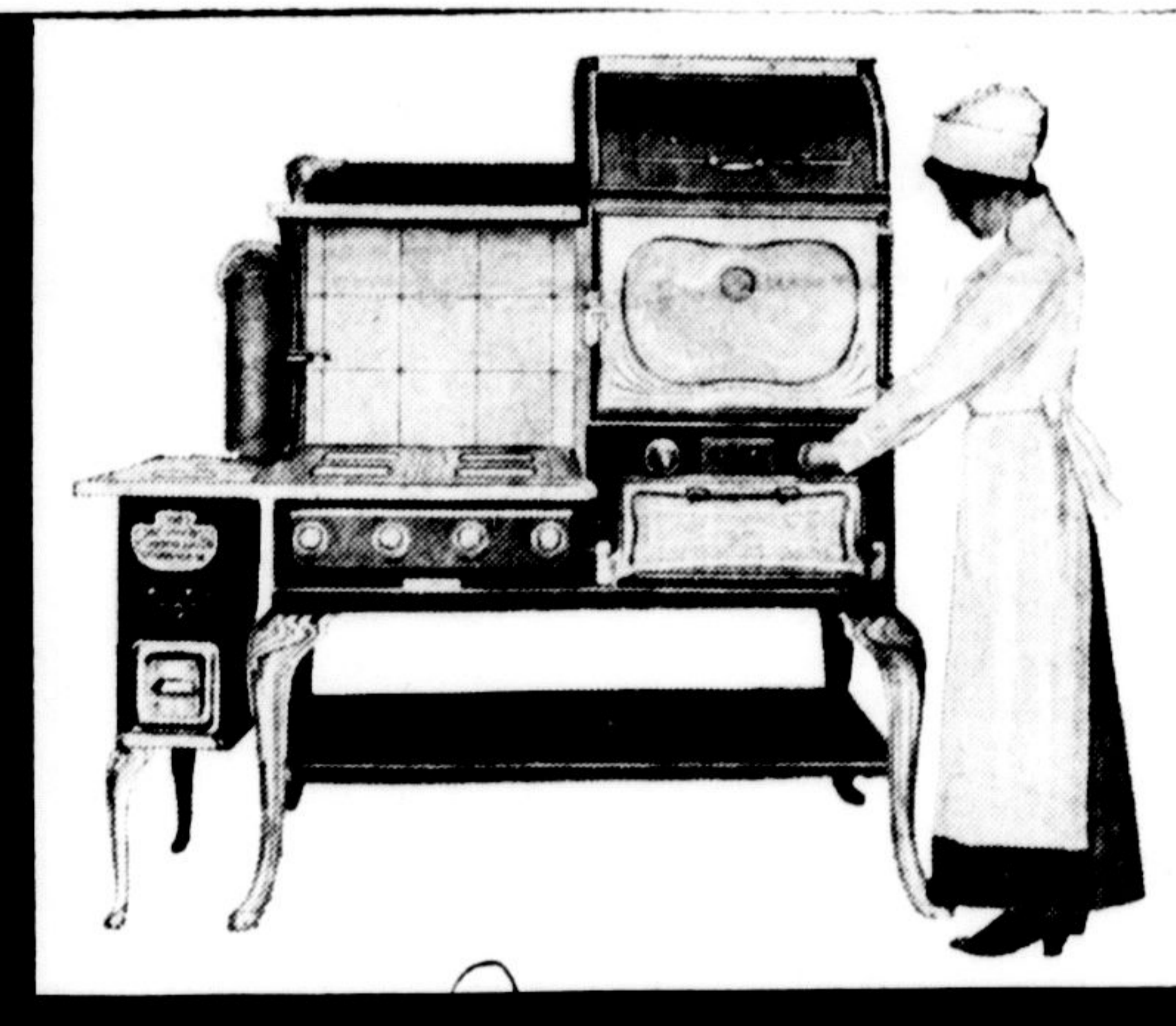
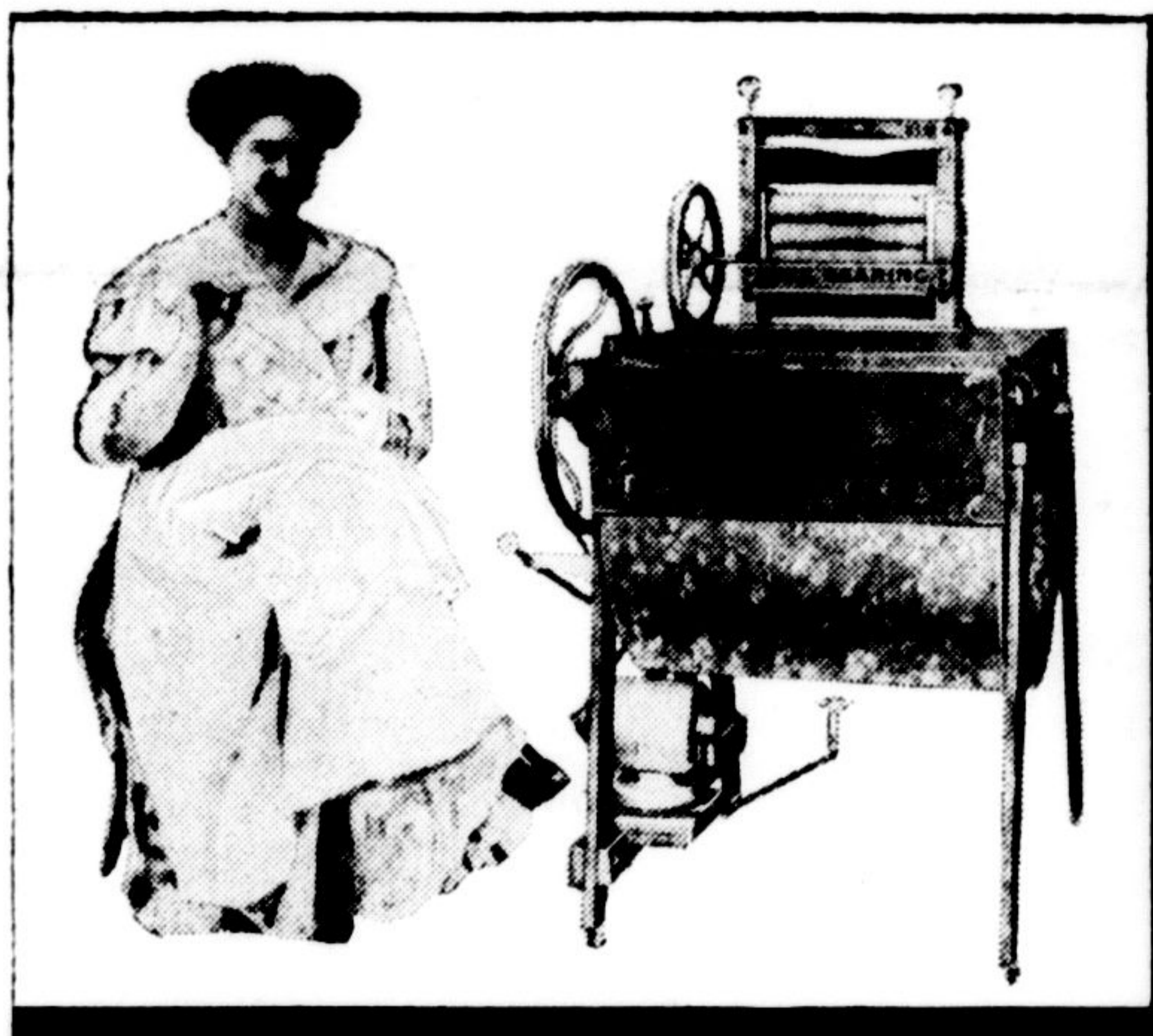

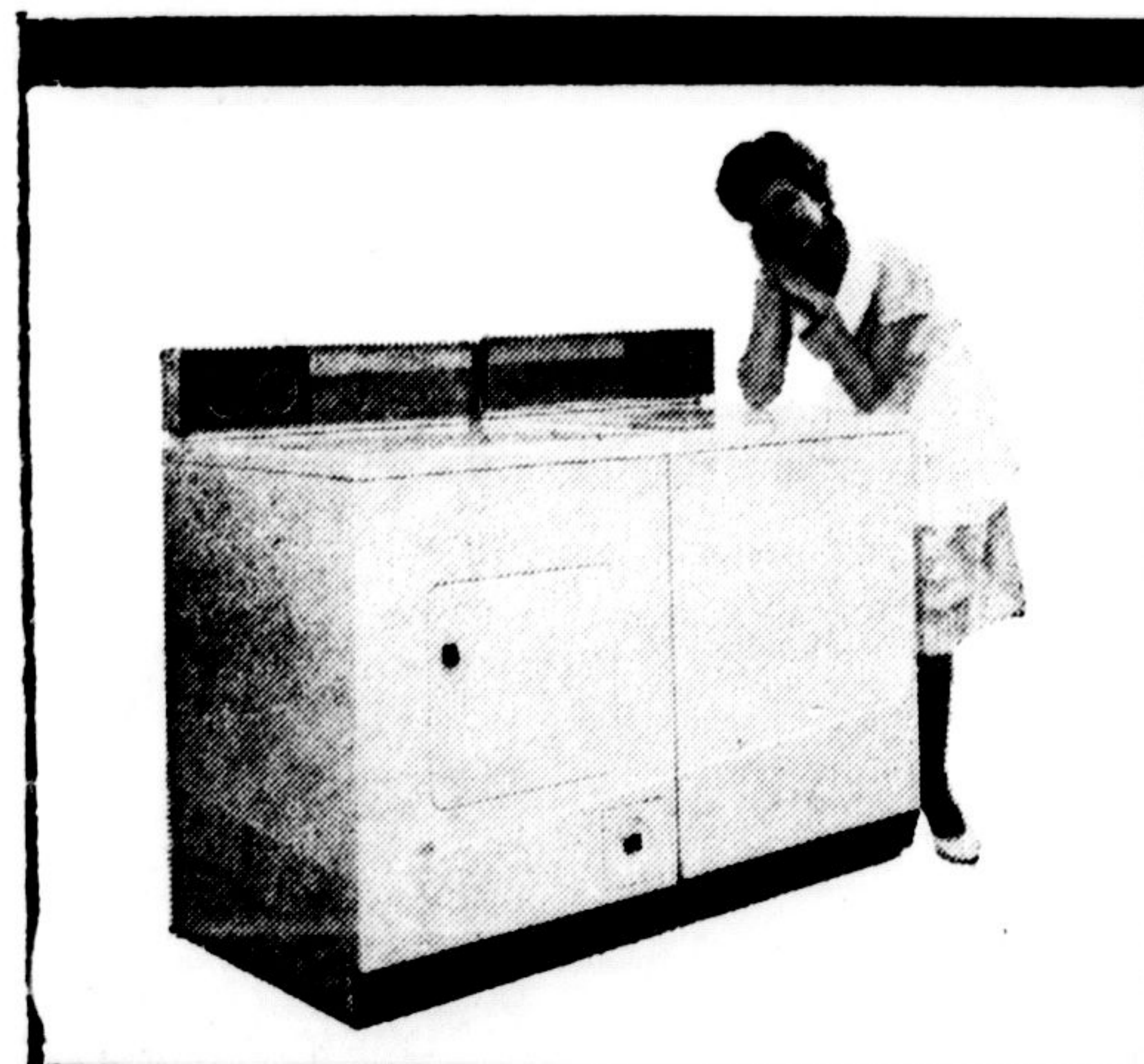
