### O.S.D. staff tops 250

Enrolment will be doubled to approximately 400 during the next few weeks, when Ontario School for the Deaf, Milton, opens the fall term with a new senior school complex in addition to the junior school which

opened in 1963. Superintendent D. E. Kennedy reports junior school enrolment will be over 200 and approximately 190 to 200 students are expected to launch the senior

school program. School officials are worried he opening of the senior school may be delayed somewhat by the rail strike. Beds and furniture for dormitories and some ses may have to be deferred pending the results of the strike. Junior school students will ar-

rive at the school on Wednesday and classes will begin Thursday, Sept. 8. The senior school classes will begin as soon as possible. Arrival times have been spread out over three rays to avoid confusion, as arriving students have to be assigned to a residence and classrooms.

The junior school students include about 160 returning from last year plus 10 transferred to Milton from the Belleville School for the Deaf, and about 30 five-year-olds who will just be beginning their school life.

Senior school students include several who graduated to senior school from classes in Milton, and about 100 in the 12 to 20 age group who are being transferred here from Belleville.

The senior school is a vocational and academic course which graduates students about 20 or 21 years old, with the equivalent of a Grade 10 academic standing and a Grade 12 vocational standing. The school will teach automotive trades, drafting, woodworking, upholstery, metal working, welding, beauty culture, home economics and printing.

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
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
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
