Often these young adults, many of them parents and just getting started in life, find themselves faced with a variety of symptoms — blurred or double vision, inco-ordination, stumbling or staggering gait, partial or complete paralysis.

Golden anniversary for Hughes Cleavers

A former Halton M.P. and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Hughes Cleaver of Burlington, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on Wednesday, August 24.

A Liberal, Mr. Cleaver was elected Halton's federal representative in 1935 and he set a record for this area holding the post until 1953. While in Ottawa he specialized in committee work and for 10 years was chairman of the Banking and Commerce Committee. He was also chairman of the War Expenditures Committee for two years, and chairman of the Government owned Railroad and TCA Committee.

In Burlington, he worked as a barrister and was instrumental in the development of many of the town's subdivisions. He also helped establish the Joseph Brant Memorial Hospital and served on its Board of Governors until this year.


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
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
