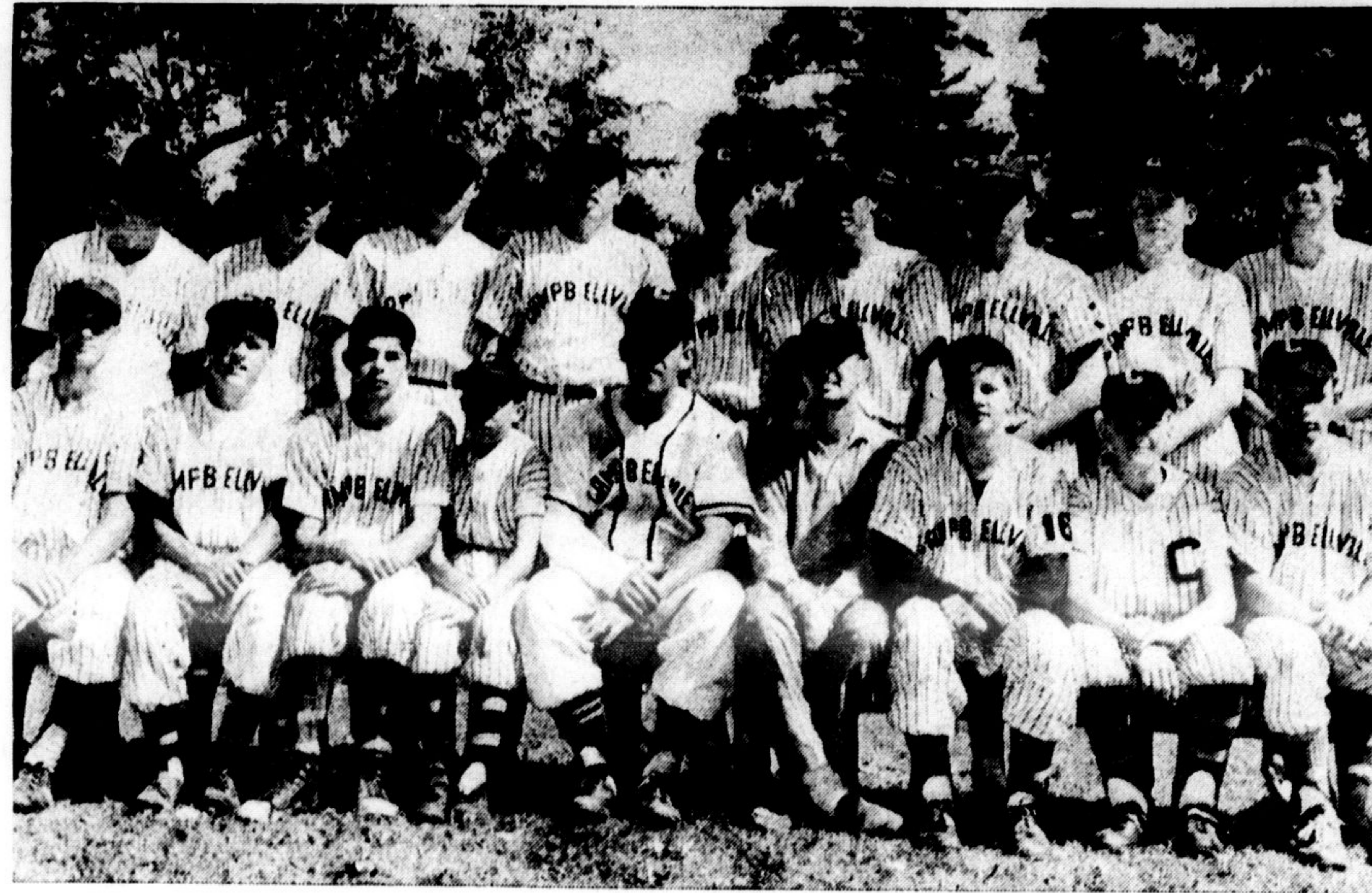

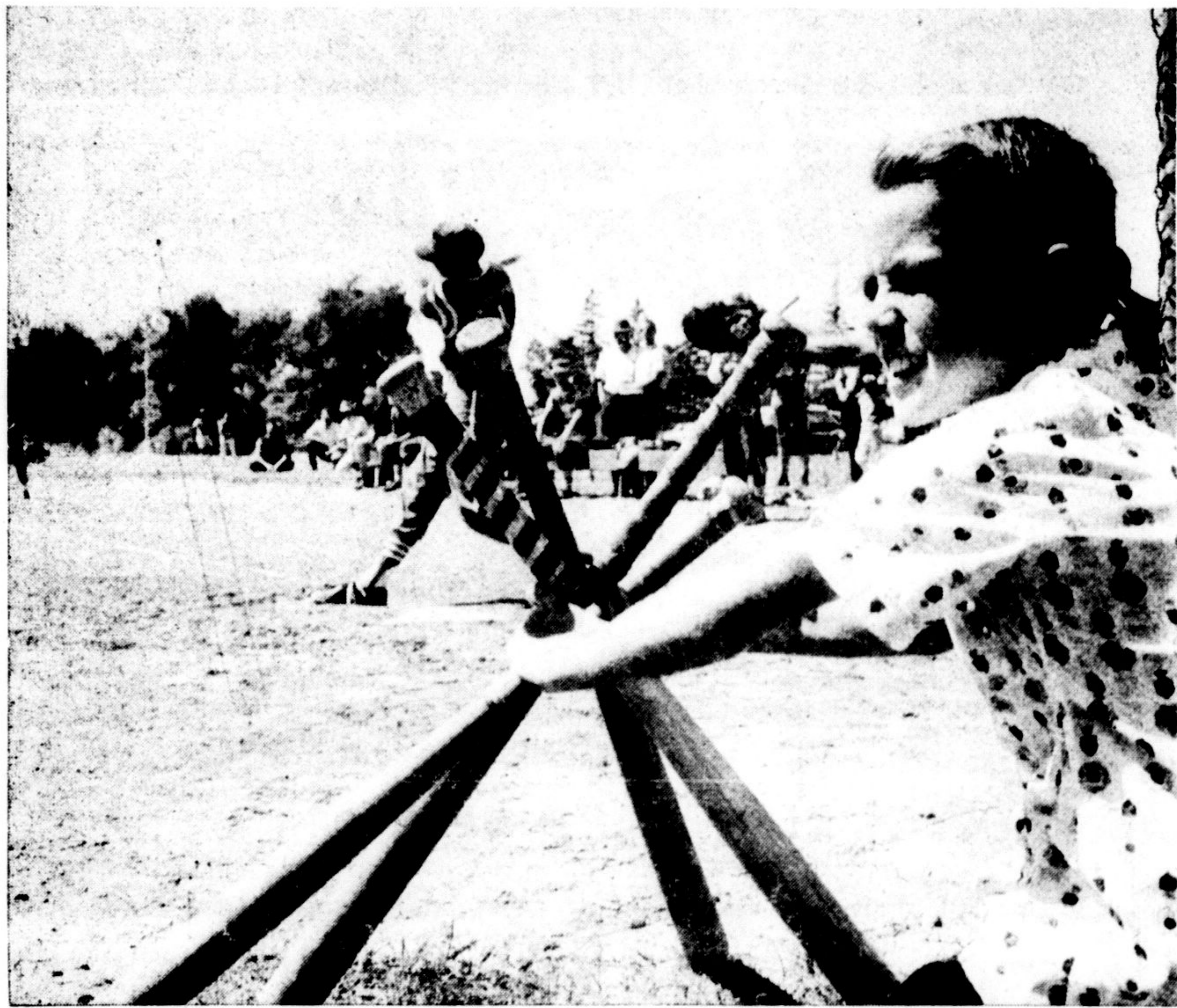
At Syracuse she won a gold medal, and in the Ontario games recently she collected four silver and five bronze medals.

126-unit motor hotel announced in Oakville

British American Realty Company, a division of British American Oil, today announced the building of its first project—a one and a half million dollar, 126-unit motor hotel and service station complex in Oakville.

The motor hotel, to have complete convention and banquet facilities, will be leased to the Holiday Inn International and will be open for business in early 1967. Holiday Inn operates more than 700 motels in Canada and the U.S.

To be situated on 12 acres of land on the northeast corner of Trafalgar Road and the Queen Elizabeth Way, the modern air-conditioned unit was designed by Toronto architects Crang and Boake. A four-bay service station, designed by the architects to complement the motor hotel, will be located on the northwest corner of the site facing Iroquois Shore Road.

Exterior surface of both structures will be sand moulded colonial brick. This was chosen to blend with Oakville's new Civic Administration Building, immediately north of the new complex and built with the same brick. The attractive hand fired brick is made by the Huntsville Brick Company in Huntsville.

Negotiations are underway for the inclusion of a branch of the Toronto-Dominion Bank in the motor hotel.
