Consider agreement press for arbitration

Milton Council will advise Oakville it considers an agreement to serve industrial land back of Milton Plaza as not binding since it was made originally with the township of Trafalgar. This was the action taken Monday night when it was noted a move to arbitrate the agreement had not been acted on in the past two months.

Deputy Reeve C. Menefy advised members he couldn't tell them what had been done, but he could tell them what should

be done. He proposed a letter to Oakville advising them Milton felt the agreement was no longer legal. If they disagreed, the matter would go to arbitration. "It could be six to 12 months in arbitration. It's a very lengthy process," he warned.

The deputy-reeve denied the need for Milton to obtain legal advice but suggested if it went to arbitration, the town solicitor should be the municipality's nominee.

The matter arose originally when a local industry, presently operating in the CPR freight sheds, purchased land back of Milton Plaza and sought services under an agreement between the towns of Milton and Oakville. Milton refused the services and deputy-reeve C. Menefy insisted at that time the agreement be arbitrated. The James Matthews Co. and other firms in the area currently receive services under the agreement,

although they are located in Oakville.

Councillor G. Krantz pointed out he had heard nothing since the suggestion for arbitration was made and wondered what progress could be reported. Mayor S. Childs reported no action had been taken.

A majority of members favored sending a letter to Oakville advising them that Milton considered the agreement was no longer applicable.

Board seeks Council support for Victoria Park walkway

Milton Parks Board sought Council support Monday in installing a permanent walk through Victoria Park to eliminate the annual spring mud and damage to grassed areas.

Board chairman Gord Collinson explained the Board had budgeted \$750 toward the project but a proper installation would cost \$1,850. Noting the problem had been one of long standing and one that delayed possible grassing of rough areas, the Board asked if council would be willing to contribute the difference between the

Board's \$750 and the total of \$1,850.

A permanent installation was planned including excavation to a depth of six inches, filled with crushed gravel and topped with asphalt paving. It would be eight feet wide to permit easy snow removal and provide sufficient width for several to walk abreast.

Deputy Reeve C. Menefy, chairman of the finance committee, indicated he would be able to offer an answer by Wednesday and council authorized the finance committee to make the decision.

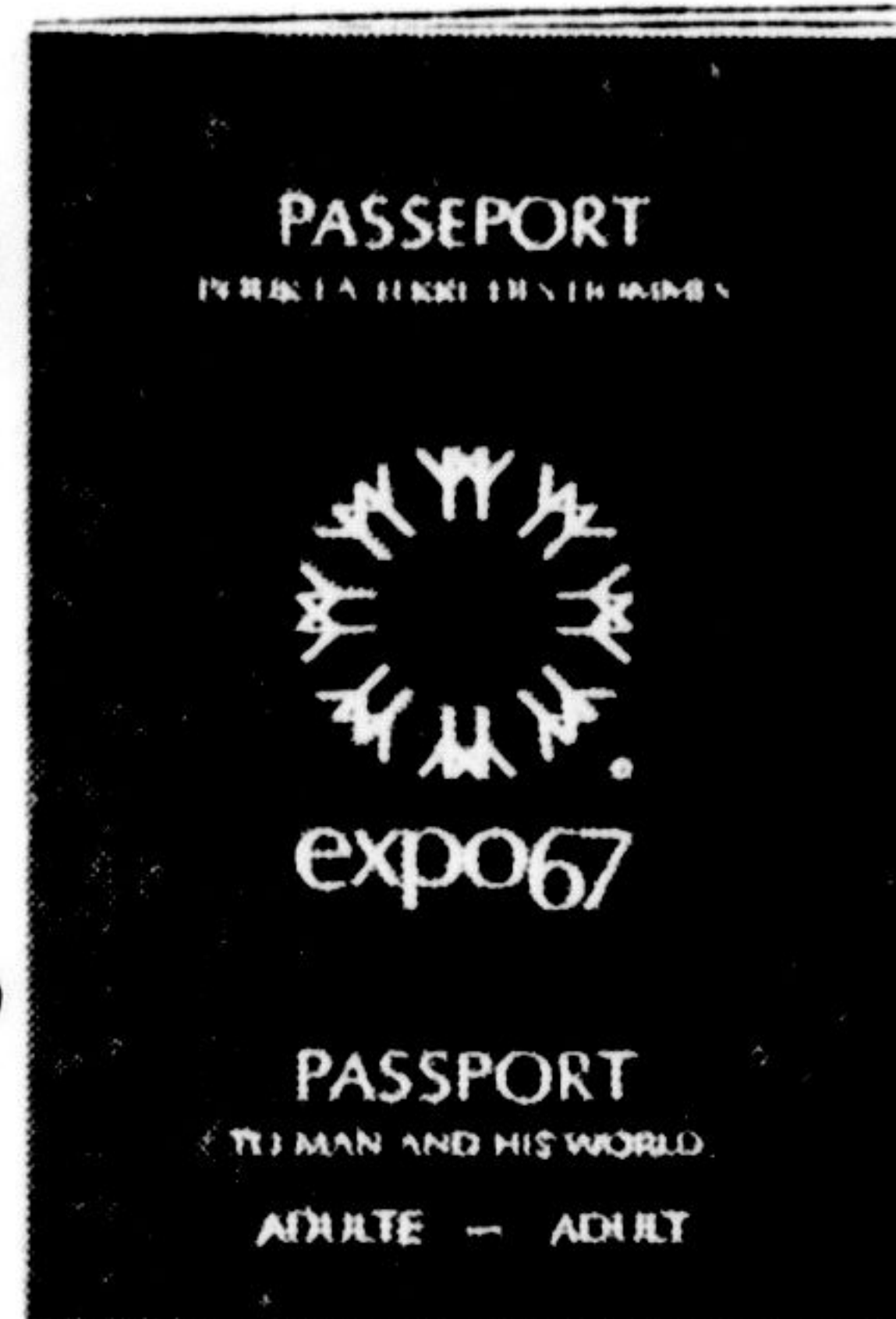
