Mrs. D. Lawson gave an informative paper on quilts and had many illustrations in charts of patterns, and also showed several blocks made up of different styles.

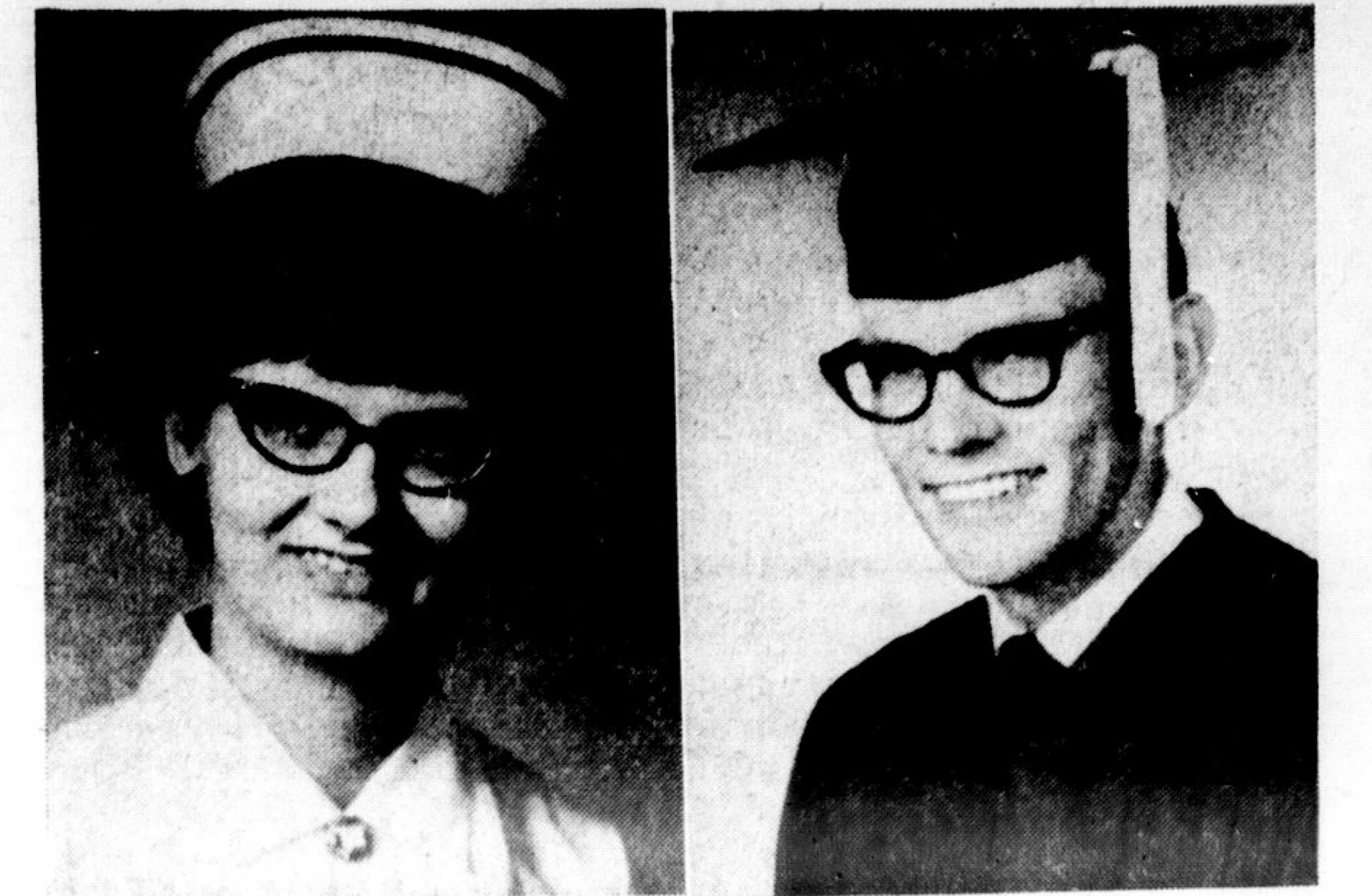
A delicious lunch served by the committee in charge brought the enjoyable afternoon to a close.
