

Milton night school offers 18 courses

Tuesday, October 18 the 1966-67 night school term will begin in Milton. Eighteen classes are offered tentatively; however, a minimum of 15 applicants will be needed to open any one.

Applicants must be 16 years of age or over and mail their \$7 basic fee with the application. The courses will consist of 14 two-hour lessons.

Courses offered this year include Conversational French, Welding, Beginners Oil Painting, Intermediate Oil Painting, General Art — All Media, Beginners Sewing, Advanced Sewing, Tailoring, Beginners Typing, Intermediate Typing, Millinery, Smocking, Needlepoint-knitting, crocheting-tatting, Floriculture, Rug Making, Copper enamelling, Hostess, and Furniture Refinishing.

Nurses meet council both sides are happy

Halton's public health nurses and County Council's special committee set up to deal with their Sept. 12 mass resignation, held their first meeting Friday and both sides report they are "satisfied" with talks to date. Another meeting has been called for this Friday evening.

Twenty-two of the 24 health nurses quit their jobs at Halton County Health Unit, after giving a month's notice, on Sept. 12. They claimed the Board of Health refused their requests for a meeting to discuss a contract. Board of Health chairman R. R. Parker said he had received no requests to meet the nurses, except through their

association, the Registered Nurses Association of Ontario which County Council does not recognize as a bargaining agent for the nurses.

The county's special committee chairman Deputy Reeve Charles Menefy of Milton said it was a "pretty good" meeting and it was hoped next Friday to review the county's personnel by-law and try to reach an amicable settlement. The first meeting lasted three and a half hours.

Nurses' Association spokesman Mrs. Flora Hesson of Oakville said the nurses are "very happy" with the present situation.

Police and town works department crews are still "in the dark" over the identity of the vandals who attempted to sabotage the mill pond centennial project by breaking down a dam at the west end of the pond Monday of last week.

"We still have no idea who did it," works superintendent Bruce McKerr said Tuesday. "At least the one we put in there to replace it is still there, anyway."

Meanwhile workmen are installing an overflow spillway at the east end of the pond near the Martin-Mill Sts. intersection, which will drain water from either the top or bottom of the pond. Mr. McKerr reported the contractor is making good progress on the job—the 18-inch drain pipe is installed and men are ready to pour the concrete slab that forms the main part of the dam.

Nassagaweya Twp. discusses control of education costs

A Thorold resolution calling for provincial government to provide at least 80 per cent of municipal education costs was endorsed by Nassagaweya Township Council at their meeting last week, and the motion sparked a lengthy discussion on education's rising costs.

Councillor Ross Gordon feared local councils and schools boards would lose control of the money, if the province took over a larger share than the approximate 53 per cent it now pays. Reeve William Coulter warned "if all the control was given to the Province, they will

come back on us and say they are going to control development too."

Councillor Mrs. Anne MacArthur felt the local elected representative had little control over education costs anyway. "They tell us how large to build our schools, and they tell us how to spend our money," she claimed.

After further discussion, the resolution was endorsed and Halton M.P.P. George A. Kerr was to be notified.

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
