

Fred Wigglesworth gives his recipe for longevity

"Eat three good meals a day, and work hard."

That's the advice for those seeking to acquire longevity and it comes from one who knows: Fred Wigglesworth, a lifelong resident of Halton County, said it Wednesday of last week as he celebrated his 90th birthday. Still hale and hearty, he looks forward to several more happy birthdays, too.

About 150 guests, including relatives, neighbors and friends visited the home of his daughter Mrs. Jim Carney on Five Sideroad Esquing last week to congratulate Mr. Wigglesworth on attaining the milestone. Members of the family served sandwiches, tea and birthday cake to the guests.

That evening the entire family went to Hornby Tower Golf Course for a family dinner.

Attending to help celebrate the day were three other generations of the Wigglesworth family. The four generations include Fred, his son Cliff of Hornby, his daughter Mrs. R. (Joan) Marshall of R.R. 1 Milton, and her son and daughter Wayne and Carolyn.

Mr. Wigglesworth was born at Ashgrove and has always lived in the Esquing-Georgetown area. The home farm was where Hornby Tower Golf Course is located, and it was in the Wigglesworth name from 1890 until a few years ago when it was sold for use as a golf course.

Retiring from farming about 1943, Mr. Wigglesworth lived at Ashgrove for a while, then moved to Georgetown where he spends his winters. In the summer he takes trips or lives with members of the family, and last year he spent four months in Florida.

During his years on the farm, he kept fancy show horses and hackneys. He loved to show

them at fairs and the Royal Winter Fair and the C.N.E. "When you have a hobby like that, it takes your mind off the work," he summed up.

His family included two sons and a daughter, Cliff of R.R. 2

Georgetown and Mrs. J. Carney (Isobel) of R.R. 3 Georgetown and a son Howard of Georgetown who died a few years ago. There are also eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

300 to tour local projects

Halton Authority hosts conservation conference

An all-day bus tour of projects of the Halton Region Conservation Authority, topped off by a special beef barbecue and bean bake at Kelso, will highlight the 10th biennial conference of the Conservation Authorities of Ontario being held in Hamilton Wednesday to Friday of this week.

Halton Region Conservation Authority is official host to the conference, which is being held at the Holiday Inn in Hamilton. Business sessions will take up most of Wednesday and Friday, but the big day is Thursday, when an estimated 300 delegates from all over Ontario will board buses to visit Halton County and a wide variety of projects sponsored by the host Authority.

Dr. C. A. Martin of M.R.C.A., vice-chairman of the H.R.C.A., is chairman of the conference planning committee and is ably assisted by a committee of six others, including the Authority chairman Ralph Sherwood of Puslinch, George S. Atkins of Bronte, and Max B. Hatherley of Milton, who is acting as secretary-treasurer for the three-day conference. About 350 are expected to register for the conference.

Thursday's bus tour begins in Hamilton at 9 a.m. and travels to the B-P Refinery Park on the Lakeshore road where Burlington Mayor Lloyd Berryman and a B-P representative will greet the delegates, and speak of the co-operation between industrialists and conservationists. The tour continues to Oakville for a coffee break at Coronation Park where Oakville Mayor F. McLean Anderson will greet the guests.

Buses leave there for a visit to several conservation projects in Oakville, including the Sixteen Valley Conservation Area, several farm ponds and the Agerton damsite. Lunch stop is at Rattlesnake Point Park on the escarpment west of Milton.

Next they will visit Indian Creek and Mount Nemo, then Carlisle Community Pond, the Mountsberg reservoir and the Burns damsite, stopping in mid-afternoon at the beautiful Crawford's Lake, south of Campbellville for a coffee break. The final leg of the tour takes them to Dufferin Quarry and conservation projects in North Halton then to Kelso for the 6 p.m. supper. Throughout the day members of H.R.C.A. and staffers will give commentaries on the places to be visited.

The supper, featuring entertainment by master of ceremonies Vince Mountford, consists of

a beef barbecue by well-known Oakville chef Tom Hayes, and beans specially roasted by Mr. and Mrs. Jean-Jean-Louis of the Canadian International Paper Company in Montreal.

Chairman Sherwood will be in charge of the Friday program when several top-notch speakers will address the delegates.

Oakville chef Tom Hayes, and Dr. Martin will chair the opening luncheon on the Wednesday.

The Hon. J. R. Simonett, Minister of Energy and Resources management, will be the main speaker at the reception and dinner Wednesday evening.

Members of Milton Council met Monday for a regular meeting and:

- Learned the present ambulance service would be continued to the town, according to information given Mayor S. G. Childs in a discussion with Murray McBeth, operator of the new service. Letter of confirmation is expected.
- Referred to the Recreation Committee a request for municipal recognition of the Ontario "B" champion Esso Tykes.
- Requested a correction in Daily Commercial News regarding a report on the lettering of the report for the centennial spillway project. The report erred in the name of the committee chairman and the architect.
- Approved the proclamation of Fire Prevention Week from October 9 to October 15.
- Permitted a water service connection to Walker property under the terms of a previous agreement made at the time the water line was installed to the town. The Walker property is on 10 Sideroad, outside the municipal boundary.
- Accepted the tender of Imperial Oil in supplying gas for town vehicles at 22.9 cents a gallon. The company is to supply and install the tank and pump at the site of the proposed works building at the Disposal Plant site. The contract is for two years.
- Approved purchase of two wreaths for the annual Legion Decoration Day event.

St. John receives ambulance gift of Oakville division

Milton's newly-chartered St. John Ambulance Brigade members are now the proud owners of a used ambulance vehicle, which will assist them in regular patrols at Milton Arena, at sports events and fair grounds duties.

The ambulance, a 1953 Pontiac with just 38,000 miles on it, was donated to the Milton group last week by the Oakville division of the St. John Ambulance. The Oakville group just received a new vehicle and decided to let Milton have their old one, complete with stretcher, flashing lights and siren.

The vehicle was originally built as an ambulance, and will be easy to equip with a few more essentials necessary for St. John work. It got its first workout on the weekend as St. John volunteers attended a walkathon project on Highway 5.

Brigade superintendent Don Miller pointed out the St. John group has no intention at the present time of launching an ambulance transportation ser-

vice for Milton. The newly-formed brigade does not have enough members to form a regular 24 hours a day, seven days a week ambulance service, as such a service would require about 100 men available as drivers on shifts.

The vehicle will accompany St. John members on regular patrols at arena hockey games and other local events, replacing ambulance vehicles they have borrowed in the past from neighboring St. John groups.
